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Friends,

The warm spring is on the horizon. This has been an especially frigid winter thus far.

Northwestern continues to be the school district to follow, the district others desire to emulate and partner with. The success of our students is so very evident. Through their accomplishments and feedback the fine education and quality of our students is evident.

The accomplishments of our students has been fantastic. The accolades received for our educational excellence and leadership by the educational community has been astounding. The articles within this newsletter provide evidence of our schools doing the great work for our students. Whether it be fine arts, STEM programs, core foundational courses, or extracurricular activities we do prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities. More-so, we have used collaboration, grant writing, and striving for efficiencies to pursue our mission within our financial constraints. We are driven by goals for continuous improvement. Our strategic plan is our road map and promotes a vision that includes suggestions for the future that include:

- Expanded, Universal Preschool is our goal. Our STEM Preschool is EXCELLENT and we are striving to have two STEM Preschool classes for the 2018-2019SY.
- Pursuit of the new Ohio STEM Learning Network's "STEAM Designation" for each of our buildings in recognition of our extraordinary fine arts programs.
- Continuing to provide needed supports for our students with disabilities and at-risk students.
- Expanding gifted and talented opportunities and extended learning.

- Operating under a balanced budget.
- Continue refining and expanding authentic learning through Project-based learning and STEM, as well as our Career Pathways and Career Planning.
- Expanded and improved Science and career pathway lab spaces – most especially at the high school
- Updating our current Library-Media Centers to high tech Makerspace Innovation Lab Media Centers (in line with our career and collaborative project-based learning instructional philosophy). Our MS is completed with HS and ES anticipated being converted over the next 1½ years.
- Continue and complete the recommissioning and updates of our HVAC systems over the next two years.
- Completion of the HS fire suppression system this summer.
- Theatre lighting replacement.
- Studying flexible hours, days, year scheduling.
- Adjacent land acquisition as opportunities arise down the road and funds might allow.

As far as our budget, we are currently in "Fiscal Watch" status as are many, many school districts in Ohio - due to inadequate state funding that was reduced significantly, then has essentially been flat-lined for the past 7 years in spite of many additional state and federal mandates. This "Fiscal Watch" means we are projected to spend more than we bring in this year and in ensuing years and that we have sufficient carry-over revenue to remain in the black less than 3 years. We have created a budged revision and plan of action to balance our revenue and expenditures. The reasons for the deficit spending stems from the major costs in updating and recommissioning our HVAC systems the past few years and planned for the next two years, the timing of the emergency levy that we just started collecting this past July, major increases in health insurance costs, in addition to inadequate state funding, as well as bleeding from online charter schools (which the state allows to not only take our state funds, but also take local funds from us).

We will continue to pursue grants and contributions, as well as consider reductions to

live within our means to ensure that these are affordable as we move forward with our mission in preparing our students today for tomorrow's opportunities, as has been our practice.

Our community has so much to be grateful for - our families, friends, and wonderful school system. In our schools we have extraordinary teachers and support staff, wonderful administrators, and wise board members. We also have numerous support organizations which help our mission such as Ruritans, All Sports, PTOs, Music Boosters, Alumni & Friends, FFA Alumni, etc. Without our community of leaders working collaboratively and exhibiting transparency we would not be serving our students to the fantastic degree that we are. This being "School Board Recognition Month" I want to thank our 5 outstanding School Board Members for their leadership and support - Phil Keener, Kim Wellert, Laura Woodring, Chuck Beck, Paula Abrecht. We are blessed with the 5 amazing leaders!

I take great pride in sharing the continued accomplishments of our students, community, and schools. The supports and relationships throughout our community are unique. We can take great pride in our schools and together we can continue to strive for even greater heights. With our dedicated administrators, staff, and community we will continue striving for and achieving well-beyond expectations.

We are all about excellence and increasing expectations at Northwestern. Within our Northwestern family we will continue to focus on the needs of our students. We will continue to prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!

I am always willing to listen to ideas, questions, and concerns from students, parents, and anyone in our community. It is only by asking, sharing, and participating that we can continue our important work. Please do not hesitate to contact me for any reason and "thank you" for your ongoing support.

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Higher Education for Older Adults

Ohio State University graduate-level Program 60 allows Ohio residents age 60 and older to take Ohio State University classes tuition-free on a non-credit, non-degree basis. In most cases, all they need to do is signup for Program 60 and get permission from the instructor of each class they want to take. Courses can be taken at the OSU Wooster Campus as well as main campus or any OSU satellite campus.

This semester, Program 60 had 336 students enrolled in courses at Ohio State and 792 registered participants.

What Program 60 provides older adults is not only an opportunity for learning, but also an opportunity for building relationships and emotional satisfaction in life," said Holly Dabelko-Schoeny, professor of social work at Ohio State..

If there is anything that unites people who take Program 60 classes, it is a life-long interest in learning.

Taking classes on art, medieval history, women in cinema, astronomy, renewable energy, technology, or just about any content is available.

Many participants do not take the exams or write the papers assigned in class. But that doesn't mean that students aren't interested in learning the material in their classes. The social work study found that 86 percent of Program 60 students were motivated to participate in order to develop their knowledge.

What Program 60 participants get from taking classes goes beyond the usual advice for older people to keep their mind active.

"They are able to pursue areas of interest from a huge catalog of classes at Ohio State," says Dabelko-Schoeny. "It is not just exercising your brain with crossword puzzles or Sudoku. It is about growth and development as a person."

Many participants share how much they enjoyed interacting not only with their instructors, but especially with the younger students in their classes. This inter-generational interaction is a key part of what makes Program 60 successful. In fact, a study found that Program 60 participants thought the program contributed more to expanding their social network with younger generations than with other older participants in the program. What Program 60 does is provide a unique opportunity for cross-generational relationship building.

And it is not only the older students who benefit. Younger students ask for advice about a variety of experiences from participants, including about finding jobs, interviewing, life lessons, and improving their resume.

"Program 60 counters some of our societal stereotypes about how we stop learning and growing and developing intellectually and socially as we get older," Dabelko-Schoeny says. Contact Ohio State University for more information about enrolling in this unique program!

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Title I & Special Education (IDEA) Annual Notifications

The elementary and middle school are designated as Title I buildings and participate in the Title I with "school-wide" service status. Northwestern encourages active, ongoing parent involvement with their child's education, which is a parental right under Title I. Collaboration between student, parents, teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators are strongly correlated with student achievement and success.

A special Title I and IDEA (Special Education) parental planning and involvement meeting is held annually at the March Board of Education regular meeting. These meetings are held the 3rd Monday in March at 7:00PM in the High School library. This is our annual parent involvement & collaborative planning meeting for our Special Education (IDEA) and Title I programs. We discuss current programs and collaboratively plan for utilization of these funds for the upcoming school year. Last March parents, community members, administrators and the Board of Education discussed and planned for this year's programs. Our Special Education, Title I, as well as Gifted Services were also an important part of our recently completed Strategic Plan Meeting discussions.

Please contact your child's teacher, building administrator, intervention specialist, Title I coordinator, or special education coordinator with questions, concerns, comments, performance data, suggestions, and/or desire for increased participation in the planning of your child's education, programs, curriculum, and communications utilizing Title I and IDEA federal funds.

 Parents are encouraged to request information regarding professional qualifications of their student's classroom teachers, including teacher state qualifications & licensing appropriate to grade level and subject area taught, as well as if the teacher is teaching under a temporary license in which state qualifications or licensing qualifications might be temporarily waived. In addition, parents have a right to request information regarding baccalaureate degree major, graduate school certification, field of discipline, and whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals, and if so, their qualifications.

- Note: 100% of Northwestern District teachers are HQT (Highly Qualified Teachers), and 100% of paraprofessionals are HQ (Highly Qualified). Highly Qualified Paraprofessionals must hold an Associate's Degree, 2+ years of college, or passed the rigorous state academic assessment.
- Northwestern school district consistently strives to utilize all federal, state, and local dollars wisely with the optimal impact on student achievement. We encourage parental participation and input into possible improvements of the fund utilization – especially with Title I funds.
- Northwestern has zero "targeted assistance" schools for the current school year. In addition, no buildings are in "continuous improvement" status or lower as determined by the state of Ohio.
- All current and former migratory, transient, and homeless students enrolling at Northwestern receive the same Title I and Special education Services as other children in Northwestern Schools as determined by school-wide programs, specialized programs, and IEPs. Northwestern serves all students and does not discriminate services based upon gender, race, or disability.
- Northwestern participates in the Tri-County ESC Preschool Consortium for both handicapped and traditional preschool children. Title I-A and school district funds are used to support these programs.
- Northwestern has LEP (Limited English Proficient) support for LEP students. LEP students and their parents are encouraged to discuss additional needs relative to their language barrier and beyond current LEP and Title I support.
- Northwestern coordinates and integrates federal, state, and local funds that include programs required under NCLB (No Child Left Behind), bullying, violence prevention, nutrition,

head start, job training, and vocational & technical education.

• Northwestern consults with nonpublic and private schools regarding available title I services for schools located within the Northwestern School District and those schools outside on the Northwestern School District having Northwestern school district resident students attending.

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FOOD SERVICE NEWS

Winter is REALLY here this year. We have already experienced several delay days, but as a reminder to all there is NO breakfast served at any of the schools if we have a delay. We also have started selling frozen yogurt from Eva's Yogurt in Ashland. The cost is \$2.00 per cup and comes in a variety of flavors. The yogurt will meet the USDA standard for healthy snacks so be sure to ask you kids if they have tried it and if they like it! Please also remember that you can apply for free or reduced price meals any time throughout the school year. If you are approved at any time of the year it will extend to all meals we serve, breakfast and lunch.

This school year we partnered with A Whole Community to pilot a program of farm to school and fresh local produce. Through the efforts of Karen Potter from A Whole Community we were able to partner with Local Roots out of Wooster and had some fresh produce items delivered to the district. Most of the produce was used in some kind of dish and available to all students for taste testing if they wanted. Our goal was to expose students to a variety of vegetables that they might not get to see or taste in their own homes. Eventually we would like to incorporate those and more vegetables into our daily breakfast and lunch offerings and menus. As a final meeting for the year we were treated to a visit from a chef for an informal training session and a taste testing experience for a few 4th graders. Chef Ben the executive chef at "Brio Tuscan Restaurant" in Columbus at the Polaris Mall came and demonstrated how to cook fresh broccoli and then saute it with butter and garlic. The other vegetable he showed us how to cook was sweet potatoes. We baked them in the oven and then removed the skins and mashed them. He just added a bit of butter but we decided the kids would like it better with some cinnamon and maybe some brown sugar! After our cooking demo the 4th graders joined us in the cafeteria for a taste testing. Each group was given a paper to answer a few basic questions and a small cup and spoon of the food. When the results were tallied it was decided that the students really liked both vegetables and would eat them if they were cooked and served in that way.

Karen Potter then gave the pans and basket that Chef Ben used as a gift to the school district. We have not fixed the vegetables for the lunch program as of yet but we are looking ahead to future menus where broccoli and sweet potatoes will be served using our new skills and equipment. We had a great first year experience.



HONORING OUR LOCAL VETERANS

The American Legion Post 499 hosted their annual Veterans Banquet to honor the local Veterans of our community. "Our service organization represents those who have honorably served our country and are still serving the community, state and nation as volunteers." The dinner was opened by Vice Commander Donald Prochazka, Jr and lead in prayer by Chaplin Jon Shadley. The Veterans and their guest were served by members of the Legion and the Auxiliary.

During the meal the Northwestern High School delegates from Buckeye Girls State (hosted at the University of Mount Union, June 11-17, 2017) Emily Bouffard and Alyssa Toppins, and delegates from Buckeye Boys State (hosted at Miami University June 11-18, 2017) Steven Cozzuli and Garret Dever were introduced.

They each spoke about their experiences of what leadership positions they held, what they learned about the government, how they related to other delegates, and that they continue to communicate with other delegates today. The guest speaker of the night was Colonel Walter M. Duzzny who gave a very entertaining, emotional, and meaningful speech about the military. Thus beginning a conversation of memories and the child got to hear stories of the father never known. In closing Col. Duzzny ended with the words God Bless the USA!! Hello from Northwestern High School,

As time rolls on, we can be assured that winter will gave way to spring - bringing with it the spring assessment season. We have now phased out the Ohio Graduation Test. Our seniors are the first class to utilize End of Course tests as their graduation standard. Our students will be taking End of Course tests if they are enrolled in any of the following classes: English 9, English 10, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology, American History and Government. The end of course tests will be in April. Students will take these assessments and need to accumulate at least 18 points across these tests, as a graduation requirement. There will be retest opportunities, where necessary. We are looking at our options and we will release a test schedule once we have finalized the plans. We will meet the requirements, but keep our focus on educating our children to the very best of our ability rather than focus on the assess-

We are very proud of the body of work completed by our students in senior seminar, internships and capstone classes. Thank you to all community members who took the time to serve as mentors or to sit on the panel during presentations. It is a huge endeavor, but is very worthwhile

We have many students who are participating in the College Credit Plus program. For the 2017-18 school year we had an increase in the number of students that are taking all of their coursework on the college campuses. While we respect each student's right to make decisions on their educational opportunities we would like to put in a plug for accumulating college credits without leaving the Northwestern campus. We are shifting to allow the majority of our CCP classes to mimic the college offerings and format.

We will have offerings in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Business, Music and Agricultural Science. Please contact me or our guidance office to learn more about these opportunities. We are trying to create a scenario where our students can have the best of both worlds and not have to sacrifice time and money traveling to the campuses or sacrifice the social experience of the final years in high school.

It is the time of year that we begin planning for the coming year and will be starting the scheduling process for returning students. We have scheduled a meeting to help with this process on Tuesday March 6th at 6:00 p.m. The 2017 – 2018 course selection books will be available on-line. As expected, our curriculum is always evolving. We have some new course offerings in our Math, English, and Social Studies. A capstone course in the clean energy pathway will be added and we will be releasing the third class in the computer science pathway. We will also be working to launch a teacher education pathway. Please contact us with any questions you may have, relative to your child's academic selections.

We have had many exciting things going on at the high school. The music and visual arts programs have continued to perform well. Many community members have had the pleasure of listening to their concert performances and seeing their displayed work. We have participated in the One Act Play Festival. Our winter sports teams have worked hard and have given their best efforts.

A reminder to all community members; thanks to the generosity of the Northwestern All-Sports Association and Northwestern High School Physical Education classes now has a wellequipped fitness room. The fitness room is equipped with 2 treadmills, 2 ellipticals, upright bikes & recumbent bikes. The fitness room is located on the Northwest Corner of the High School in Room 400. The room is available to members of the Northwestern Community from 4:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on days that the high school is in session. Northwestern Middle School students may use the equipment if accompanied by an adult. For safety reasons, we cannot allow children 11 or younger to use the equipment. Access to the fitness room may vary with the season, and the school calendar. Community members have access to the track during daylight hours. Please restrict your use to the outside four lanes to reduce the wear on the inner lanes, which have more use during athletic events. The free weight facility in the community building is also available to community members, with restrictions. During the school day it can be accessed by signing in and getting a key from the board office. If we have a physical education class using the facility, they have priority. These classes are typically scheduled from 7:20 to 9:32. After school hours the weight room is generally utilized by athletic teams, making the facility unavailable. If the board office is closed and the athletic teams have finished their practices, access to the weight room may be achieved through a coach or Northwestern staff member who has a key, but they must be on the premises with you as a supervisor. These tightened restrictions are a result of trying to be good members of the community while balancing issues related to safety and liability.

We have so many people that invest so much for our students and children. Thank you for your continued support as we continue the work of "Preparing our Students Today for Tomorrow's Opportunities".


Reminder: Parent/Guardian Drop off and Pick-Up

NMS CAREER FAIR

On Thursday, January 11, students in Mrs. St. Clair's English classes participated in their very first Career Fair. Unlike other career fairs where area professionals come to the school to share their expertise with students, the students, in this case, were the ones presenting the career information. Each student participated in two separate events during the morning, which involved Job Shadow presentations and Student Mock Interviews.

The Career Fair was developed to allow students the opportunity to share their career expertise with area professionals. The presentation segment of the morning involved students presenting their Job Shadow project to their peers, a teacher, and a professional who had experience in that area/field. Student presentations were designed to share both research information, as well as, their observations during their job shadow experience, where students are given a day from school to work within their field or to go on a field trip. Students were required to have a prepared presentation to share with the group that accurately described the career that they chose. Students also fielded questions from the adults at the end of their presentation.

"I would hire you tomorrow," was among the comments students heard during the mock interview process, which was the second part of the morning. Participating in this segment, students were interviewed individually by one of multiple area professionals who volunteered.

Students rotated through the gym in the morning, visiting different tables and professionals. Throughout their session, students received both verbal and written feedback on their performance. Each volunteer was instructed to coach students on their interview skills, allowing for students to practice and understand the skills necessary for a successful interview.

The comments about the Career Fair was overwhelmingly positive from students, staff, and the professionals who volunteered to help. By the end of the morning, most students were able to speak with multiple adults and professionals, which allowed for both student practice and valuable feedback. By allowing students to practice both their presentation and interview skills, students were able to learn from professionals about the expectations in today's job market, helping them to better prepare for future opportunities. The Career Fair is one of the many ways that NMS continues to strive to meet our district mission statement- "preparing students today for tomorrow's opportunities!"

Northwestern Elementary and Northwestern High School are teaming together with ANAZAO Community partners to create a Youthled Mentoring Program called "Husky Buddies". Husky Buddies uses a peer mentoring approach with high school student leaders being trained to work with elementary students.

The high school students provide encouragement, friendship and role modeling.

Participation in the Husky Buddy program is voluntary for the elementary and high school students. It is overseen by school student services staff and building principals. A big Thank You to Dawn Wiles, Steve McCumber, Mike Burkholder and Anazao for helping develop the program.

Working Together Corner

Student Success depends heavily on school and home working together. The word "MINDSET" and "DETERMINATION" are words used often at NES. Students need to hear these words from parents and staff in relation to making an effort, working hard, never giving up, and planning ahead are all important. We need to encourage students to set reasonable expectations, and celebrate with them when they make progress toward their goal. In general, a growth mindset is the belief that intelligence and 'smartness' can also be learned and that the brain grows from experience and effort. The opposite, a fixed mindset, is the idea that you are smart, or you are not. In math for example, that translates into "some people are good at math and some are not." Did you know that praising efforts, rather than intelligence or results, can impact a child's ability to persevere in challenges?! The goal is to have children thrive on challenges and see failures, not as a sign of low intelligence, but as a learning opportunity. That is where "The Power of YET" comes into play! For example, "I may not understand this math problem yet!" Brain research tells us that making mistakes actually wires more connections into the brain. When a person has a growth mindset, they accept challenges, see their efforts as worthwhile, and are open to learning from mistakes. How can we all help? Here are some simple ways through conversations that take place at home and the school environment.

- Adding "yet" when they claim they are "not good at this"
- Respond: You are not good at it "yet."

• Ask questions that focus on their effort and choices and get them to reflect on satisfaction of that effort (What did you learn today? What mistakes did you make that taught you something? What did you try hard at today?)

Thomas Edison said that he did not fail at making the light bulb one thousand times, but rather that "the light bulb was an invention with 1,000 steps."

It's always hard to believe when we're midway through the year and already gearing up for next year. Scheduling presentations to students to receive information about selecting classes for next year will take place in February. I hope you'll be able to attend the annual parent scheduling meeting to hear about course options for next year and all the options we are able to offer our students; details on the meeting will coming on daily announcements. I am proud of the work our seniors have been doing on college applications and career planning through the Naviance system. Almost 50% of our seniors have submitted college applications to 2-year and 4-year schools, with most students applying to at least 3 colleges. Scholarship announcements are added on Naviance as information is received. Through Senior Seminar, Internships, Apprenticeships, and our Senior Capstone classes, seniors are also receiving practical, hands-on career training and learning valuable real-world skills that employers are seeking.

Please be sure to check out the Guidance site for exciting Summer Opportunities for students including internships, camps, etc.

Congratulations to our 8 sophomores and juniors who self-selected to take the PSAT in October. All 8 students performed above the 50th percentile compared to all other students nationwide who tested. We also have four students who scored at 90th percentile or above: Claire Bond, Cortney Hoff, Katie Koontz, and Olivia Wakefield. Katie and Olivia scored in the top 1% of all juniors in the country, and we are looking forward to see if they advance in the National Merit Scholarship selection process.

A few reminders for upcoming dates/events of things happening at the high school:

- February 27: Juniors will take the state ACT at the high school. This is offered at no cost to families and students do NOT register online for this particular test only.
- March 9: Regular deadline to register for the national April 14th ACT. Students must register themselves online at www.act.org. This is an important test for any student interested in College Credit Plus (CCP) next year if they have not already taken the ACT and received a qualifying score.
- April 1: Any student interested in CCP for next year must have returned a completed "CCP Intent Form" to the Guidance Office. See guidance or download the form from the Guidance website.
