
From our Acting-Superintendent....

The district is not permitted to operate in the negative. Therefore, the district would have to reduce its operating budget or raise additional revenue or do a combination of both to balance the general fund operating budget.

If the Board chooses to make operating cuts to reduce the district's operating budget much of these cuts would come from reducing the district's personnel costs. This is because we are in the education business and approximately 85% of the district's operating costs come from personnel salaries and benefits.

From our Treasurer...

A letter from our district Treasurer, Jerry Buccilla, and our Acting Superintendent, Julie McCumber, regarding the upcoming November 5th Ballot Initiative to Repeal the District's Income Tax Levy.

Community members have asked us numerous times over the past eight weeks how the district's operating budget would be impacted if the current income tax revenue that the district receives is repealed. To help answer this question I have summarized the impact on our operating fund if the repeal is approved on November 5th:

ESTIMATED INCOME TAX REVENUE LOSS IF REPEAL IS APPROVED

• Fiscal Year 2025: loss of approximately \$1.9 million of operating revenue

- Fiscal Year 2026: loss of approximately \$2.9 million of operating revenue
- Fiscal Year 2027: loss of approximately \$2.9 million of operating revenue

• Fiscal Year 2028: loss of approximately \$2.9 million of operating revenue

TOTAL ESTIMATED LOSS of OPERATING REVENUE: \$10.6 MILLION

The district's general operating fund will have an estimated \$3 million DEFICIT by the end of Fiscal Year 2028 if the Income Tax is repealed.

If the Board of Education chooses to raise additional revenue this would be accomplished by placing either a new operating levy on the ballot that would ask our community to increase property taxes on landowners and homeowners, or to place another income tax levy on the ballot. The Board of Education will need to consider these options very soon after the November 5th election.








STEM Apple Exploration Day!

8th Graders "Escape" the Salem Witch Trials in Mr. Woodring's American History Class!

This Halloween season, Mr. Woodring's 8th grade American History class dove into the dark and eerie chapter of the Salem witch trials through an interactive, thrilling activity: a spooky classroom escape room! Students were transported back to the year 1692 in a "Salem Village" setting, where they used their knowledge of the witch trials to unlock clues, solve puzzles, and ultimately find their way out of Mr. Woodring's "bewitched" classroom.

It combined history with teamwork, critical thinking, and just the right amount of Halloween spirit. This unique lesson not only brought the trials to life but also made history an unforgettable adventure!

6th Graders Witness the Miracle of Monarch Butterflies in Mrs. Raber's Science Class







Mrs. Raber's 6th grade science class recently celebrated a remarkable moment in nature: the release of monarch butterflies they had raised from tiny caterpillars! NHS Child Development Class Update

High school students in Mrs. Wooding's Child and Adolescent Development classes are engaging in hands-on lessons about the realities of pregnancy through the use of an "Empathy Belly." This weighted simulator replicates the physical and emotional challenges faced by pregnant individuals, offering students a deeper understanding of what it's like to carry a child.

The empathy belly is designed to mimic key symptoms of pregnancy, including extra weight gain, pressure on the bladder, shortness of breath, back pain, and even the baby's movements. Weighing around 25 to 30 pounds, the simulator is worn by students over their shoulders and around the abdomen, giving them a sense of the discomforts that develop as pregnancy progresses. So far, students have found the lesson impactful. Some express surprise at how even a short time wearing the simulator can be exhausting. "I didn't expect it to be this hard just walking or bending down," says one participant. Others express embarrassment at having to walk down the hall or through common areas in the school. It definitely makes you think about what it feels like to be pregnant!

In the near future students will extend their learning even further by honing their skills in caring for newborns through participation in the Reality Works Infant simulator experience...stay tuned.

Northwestern FFA was able to give a helping hand in cleaning up the Wayne County Fairgrounds. This material was kept out of the landfill and will be used in making other products such as

clothing, bookbags, and furniture.



Northwestern FFA attends Farm Science Review

On September 17th, members of the Northwestern FFA chapter attended the Farm Science Review on The Ohio State University's 2,100-acre Molly Caren Agricultural Center which is located two miles north of London on U.S. Route 40. Farm Science Review is a two- day agricultural and industrial exposition that visitors come to from around the states that features over 100 educational sessions, 600 exhibits, and has multiple field crop demonstrations in their Gwynne Conservation. Members of the chapter were able to tour around the exhibits which were put on by The Ohio State University and many of their science programs and agricultural teams. They also got to go on a shuttle tractor ride to the conservation area where the soil pits were to check out our knowledge in soils. Northwestern FFA Member Attended Washington Leadership Conference

INDIANAPOLIS (June 2024/National FFA Organization) – For more than 50 years, thousands of FFA members from across the country have converged in our nation's capital each summer to engage with legislators, hone civic engagement and leadership skills and create community impact projects to take back to their cities and towns.

Mallory Gilbert of the Northwestern FFA Chapter was among those students traveling to D.C this summer to attend the Washington Leadership Conference. Mallory attended the conference June 18th - 26th. She spent the week under the guidance of professionals, counselors and FFA staff. In workshops, seminars and small groups, members focused on identifying and developing their personal strengths and goals while undergoing comprehensive leadership training that will help them guide their local FFA chapters. The capstone of the event was a civic engagement activity where participants apply what they have learned to a hands-on activity.

The students participating analyzed the needs of their communities, developed wide-ranging and high-impact community service initiatives and implemented their plans with the help of their FFA chapters upon returning home. Students in recent years have promoted agricultural literacy; brought attention to abuse; collected and distributed shoes to individuals in Haiti; created a hunger awareness plan and more.

FFA members that attended were able to experience the history of our nation's capital and tour landmarks, including the Lincoln Memorial, the Capitol building, White House, Ford's Theatre, Arlington Cemetery, Smithsonian museum, and the WW2, Vietnam, and Hiroshima memorials. Each day of the conference focuses on a different principle taught through the context of our nation's capital: exploration, encouragement, advocacy and service.

The National FFA Organization is a school-based national youth leadership development organization of more than 1,000,000 student members as part of 9,163 local FFA chapters in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
