Please take enjoy this 2022 colorful fall colors season! We are in a great community in the greatest nation on earth with fantastic students for which we should all be grateful.

Our 22-23 School Year is well under way. We have Tyler Keener recently stepping-in as our new Northwestern High School Principal, for which we are very blessed. We are glad you are here Tyler and welcome your additional leadership!

Our programs are solid, our teachers and staff extremely dedicated and talented, and we continue stretching our dollars through efficient use of funds and continual seeking of additional financial resources. With this being shared, we have been maintaining and improving our buildings and grounds - taking great care of our facilities.

As far as grants, we just received word that we Northwestern Local Schools received the \$200,000 Literacy Grant award for which we had applied in September! This is a two-year grant that may be renewable for ensuing years. Also, as far as grant awards, in addition to this grant, securing our \$500,000+ Federal Entitlement Grant Funds, \$2,000 Husky Buddies Grant, \$90,000 School Bus Grant (we received \$90,000 a School Bus Grant for the 23-24 SY as well) and successful \$150,000 Safety Grant funding this school year, we have also applied for several additional grants,

which are currently pending and we will receive work of possible success in the coming weeks:

- •A second safety grant of more than \$134,000
- •\$10,000 Homeless Grant
- •A second \$10,000 Transportation Grant
- Various other smaller grants and foundation contributions

We all benefit when we can secure funds that improve our current programs and conditions and/or supplement our tax dollars. We also benefit by being frugal, and the remainder of our successful fall sports yet utilizing funds where student needs are evident. We are all about excellence and increasing expectations here at Northwestern. We will continue to prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!


The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) released the 2022 Ohio School Report Card for all districts in the state of Ohio. The State Report Card is one way to measure our educational system. It gives parents, caregivers, community members, educators and policy makers information on how district schools performance and drives local conversations on continuous improvement. The data used by ODE analyzes the performance of each disinclude: Achievement, Early Literacy, Progress, Gap Closing, Graduation, and College, Career, Workforce and Military Readiness.

The Achievement Component represents whether a student performance on state tests met established thresholds. It also indicates how well students performed on tests overall. Early Literacy Component measures reading improvement and proficiency for students in Kindergarten through Third Grade. The Progress Component looks at the growth of all examines the four-year and five-year graduation istrators, teachers and students in meeting our targeted rates of specified groups. . The College, Career, goals. Workforce and Military Readiness Component examines student preparation for the future. All but the last component is given a one to five STAR rating. The rating scale is as follows: 5 stars - significantly exceeds state standards in academics; 4 stars - exceeds state standards in academic achievement; 3 stars - meets standards in academic achievement; 2 stars -

TRANSPORTATION NEWS

We would like to welcome two new additions to our Transportation Family, Carl McCoy and Steve Gilbert. Both gentlemen have subbed for us on numerous bus routes in the past and have taken field trips as well. We are fortunate to have both of these Bus Professionals added to our team. Northwestern received two new busses for the 2022-2023 school year through The budget included a total of \$50 million for districts to purchase school buses in fiscal years 2022 and 2023. ODE developed the School Bus Purchase Program with the following goal in mind: Remove the oldest model year and highest mileage school buses used for regular route service in Ohio. School districts that qualified for the program received at least \$45,000 per bus. Northwestern is waiting on one more bus to make its way to our fleet. This presents a savings to our district of over \$90,000.



Northwestern Transportation is planning to use a NEW parent communication app called Stopfinder. Stopfinder will allow for more effective communication between the Northwestern Transportation Department and parents/guardians about their child(ren)'s transportation. We are planning the kick-off for November 1st.



Stopfinder will allow for more efficient, faster, and clearer communication when it comes to the daily communication for our students. An email will be coming soon to all Contact 1 and Contact 2 individuals who are listed on the Transportation Form section in Final Forms. Please be sure that your Final Forms data is accurate and up-to-date, this includes any time there is a change in your transportation needs.

EMERGENCY DELAY OR CANCELLATION DAYS

With the severely cold weather and winter remaining we would like to remind parents about our delay and cancellation procedures. When our school buses travel over 1,436 miles each day in our 94 square mile school district, picking up students it is imperative that the roads are safe to travel. The safety of students and drivers is the primary issue when considering whether to cancel school

If conditions are questionable regarding student and bus safety, both the Northwestern Transportation Mechanic Jonathon Wellert and Northwestern Superintendent Jeff Layton drive the roads prior to 5:00 a.m. - often communicating with each other, ODOT, Townships, County Engineers – in order to make the final decision before 5:30 a.m. At 5:30 many of our dedicated bus drivers have already begun their routes on poor weather days. The Superintendent also listens to weather forecasts and confers with other area school district superintendents - all of who also do assessments of their road conditions. A decision is made to delay or cancel school if it is unsafe for students and/or unsafe for bus travel. Since Northwestern stretches so far north-south we may not always make the same decision as other school districts. This is because we are concerned with Northwestern students first and foremost. However, we also have an obligation to also fulfill our mission of providing an excellent education for our students.

When the Wayne County Sheriff issues a Level 2 weather warning, telling motorists to drive only if it is an emergency, school is automatically cancelled. However, sometimes these announcements do not come before announcement of school closing has to occur. In addition, often the road conditions change quickly and dramatically – sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse - between the time of the final decision at 5:30 a.m. and the time MS and HS may begin with a 2-hour delay. As most people are aware the superintendent has made the extra effort to make the decision between 5:00-5:30 and closer to 5:00am if at all possible depending on the conditions and situation.

Information on school closing is available and most accurate by registering for communications. Parents, students, and community members can register for text alerts and/or e-mail alerts through our website.

The school text and e-mail alerts systems are the most efficient and immediate as far as information, please register if you have not. Additionally, district phone recordings, website, twitter, instagram, facebook, as well as radio station WQKT are the quickest to post the information. Also, calling the district or individual school building phone numbers and listening to the recorded message on our automated phone system is an option. Announcements are also made through local radio stations WQKT and WNCO as well as TV stations WEWS (Channel 5), WKYC (Channel 3), and FOX WJW (Channel 8). Television stations have between a 15-minute and 30-minute lag time before the information is posted an occasionally do post inaccurate messages or their systems become overwhelmed. Also, following a delay a decision to close is announced by 7:30 a.m. at the very latest. Otherwise, assume that we will remain open.

ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL GUIDANCE

My name is Kelsey Donohoe and I am the elementary and middle school guidance counselor. This school year has been off to a great start. We have many exciting things starting back up this school year.

At the elementary level we have Husky Buddies. Husky Buddies is a youth mentoring program where high school students have the opportunity to cultivate relationships with some of our 3rd, 4th and 5th graders. The primary goal of the program is to support, encourage and motivate students through a youth mentoring relationship. Each week our mentors and mentees meet for 30 minutes and do an activity together. An example of an activity that will take place during Husky Buddies is "Spreading Kindness" activity. Mentors and mentees will work together to create kindness posters to hang in our building. During this time mentors and mentees will brainstorm together what kindness means to them and how they can promote that to others.

At the middle school level, we have Future Fridays. Each Friday, during Extra Help, we offer students the opportunity to explore future careers through professional's activity working in the field, college and trade school representatives and military personnel. Students may be given the opportunity to engage in hands on learning, ask questions and learn something new about future options. We feel it is important for students, at the middle school level, to make a connection between what they are learning now and what they will need to know for a future career. As the year progresses it is important to keep our student's mental health in mind. We can provide support to our children by practicing mindfulness. Mindfulness is being aware of the present moment. When we are mindful we can become more focused, relaxed and alert. All these things are important for our children to be successful inside and outside of the classroom.

Some ways to practice mindfulness:

- •Take a walk
- Drawing or coloring
- Practice yoga
- •Play an instrument
- •Slowly take 5 deep breaths
- •Write in a journal
- •Use rainbow grounding technique s

A first-team NCAA All-American, Staggs received the Gene Upshaw Award as the 2009 NCAA D2 Lineman of the Year and earned an invitation to the prestigious East-West Shrine All-State Game in Orlando, Fla.

The Hilltoppers posted a sparkling 33-13 record during his four varsity seasons. The 2009 WVIAC title team led the nation in total offense and earned an NCAA playoff berth.

Staggs was a member of the Criminal Justice National Honor Society and earned a master's in Criminal Justice at the University of Cincinnati following his 2010 graduation from West Liberty.




