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Northwestern School Safety & Security Survey Results

There will be no superintendent article in this issue. Instead we are focusing on school safety and security. These articles will be the spring focus.

353 community respondents

217 of respondents have children in the one or more of the schools

136 of these respondents are also employees

We also had several anonymous student responses, as we promoted to high school students. More than 50% of respondents feel very confident or confident that appropriate safety measures have or are being implemented in Northwestern Schools.

More than 78% of respondents feel that employing a full-time resource officer at Northwestern Schools would improve safety in our schools.

82% of respondents would be in favor of the district employing a full-time resource officer. 74% of respondents would support a school levy or other funding mechanism supporting the ongoing employment and training costs of employing a resource officer.

49% of respondents feel very confident or confident that approving a select 2-3 trained individuals maintaining a locked weapon in each building would improve safety. Roughly 76% are very confident, confident, or somewhat confident that this would improve safety. However, the results seem polarized, with strong comments pro and con regarding this. Comments ranged from: "the district should arm any interested employee with a CCW" to "arming only a select few with ongoing emergency response weapon training and mental health background checks" to "opposition"

to any weapons in schools beyond law enforcement personnel", and even "I will withdraw my children if this is allowed".

54% of respondents feel very confident or confident in supporting allowing school personnel to carry weapons in the schools. More than 77% felt very supportive, supportive, or somewhat supportive. This indicates strong trust with school employees.

58% are very supportive or supportive of employees carrying a concealed weapon outside of the school day at extracurricular events on campus.

Recent instances of violence in schools and threats made in our own schools has brought a renewed awareness and fear for school safety locally. Northwestern staff, administrators, and Board Members have been discussing safety and security ongoing manner of late. We thought it wise to not only post a list of current safety precautions, new security items we were moving forward on, but also brainstormed ideas to consider. We also invited community to share perceptions and suggestions at a March 19th Community Meeting on School Safety & Security where roughly 60 community members met with administrators and board members and I to discuss this relevant and very appropriate topic.

Any member of our community desiring to share additional thoughts and ideas we welcome your input - do so through e-mail, phone call, or stop by the superintendent's office or principal's office to discuss.

The district is pursuing safe and Drug Free matching grant dollars to help defray at least the initial cost of employing a resource officer, if we do indeed pursue this. If the district goes in this direction we will also:

- search for other potential grant funds to help with the cost
- pursue potential partnerships (possibly with the Wayne County Sheriff's Dept., a local police Department, or other collaboration for times when school is not in session such as summers, fair, and Christmas holidays)
- include additional responsibilities (such as helping principals monitor social media, assisting with our current drug and alcohol testing, DARE responsibilities, building relationships with students, covering extracurricular events, etc.)

The big three items thus far that are new include:

- The district will be adding to our existing 99 security cameras mainly at the main entrances and secondary exits of the buildings.
- The district has provided Pepper Gel to administrators, secretaries, custodians, and other key personnel.
- We are studying and discussing the feasibility of employing a resource officer and when this might be possible.

The very best deterrent is many situations is forging and maintaining strong relationships and communications with staff, students, and parents; addressing mental health and behavioral issues, dealing with any bullying behavior immediately, as well as providing additional counseling supports for students and families as provided with existing staff, Catholic Charities, ANAZAO, families, and local clergy. The \$41,000 grant we have received for these counseling agencies to work with our students most in need in all of our school buildings through Wayne County JFS through Title XX funds as approved by the Wayne County Commissioners has been a much needed additional support for our children each of the past 3 years.

The latest list of current safety precautions, new security items, and brainstormed possible ideas to consider are listed on the district website. We also included the current list in tis newsletter. This will be updated as we move forward.

The complete survey results (complete with graphs) are available on the Northwestern website for all to view (minus the actual individual comments, which number in the hundreds and are being reviewed by Administration and the Board of Education for consideration).

I would like to thank our staff, parents, community members, students, administration, and our Northwestern Board of Education for the collaborative discussion that has taken place in regards to school safety and security. Together we will help make our students even more safe and secure.

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Parents, friends, and members of our Northwestern community:

The Northwestern School District appreciates the concern, love, and show of support for our administration, staff, and children exhibited by parents and community members. The safety of our children is paramount with the pervasive schools violence and threats across the area, state, and nation. Below is a summary of current safety precautions that we have in place here at Northwestern, which are listed on our district website as well as below. In addition, we have had MARCs emergency radios for a few years now, we have 99 campus security cameras, three cameras on each of our buses, and we are discussing and initiating several other new additional precautions as well.

Blessings to each of you and thanks for your prayers, faith, and your support for everyone protecting our children. Know that we have an exceptional faculty, staff, and administrative team here at Northwestern who are dedicated to the learning, development, and safety of children in our care.

A recent excellent parent suggestion was made for parents to talk with their children about remaining aware of situations, bullying, or troubled students and to please remind children to share these concerns and situations with school adults and their parents. I echo this and also remind parents to monitor your children's electronic devices and social media – to be aware of conversations they are having and with whom.

Another excellent recent community member suggestion was made for additional peer supports through a possible training program in order for adults to have a greater awareness of social media concerns. The district is moving forward with this suggestion in partnership with ANAZAO.

Please know that we are and will continue doing everything in our power to provide a safe and secure learning environment for our children.

Summary of Current Safety Measures

Northwestern's buildings remain secured during the school day. What we have in place has not changed dramatically, but have become more detailed, evolved over time, and responses have become more rehearsed.

We pray that no such cowardly and inhumane violent acts such as what has occurred in Florida toward children occur in our community.

We also pray that we have the strength of relationships and awareness of our own children and our environment to recognize, intercede, and support individual students in crisis so we can stop any potential self-harm as well.

As far as school building and district-wide security, we have layers of security that include:

- · Locked doors and windows.
- Numerous security cameras outside our buildings as well as inside our buildings.
- Security cameras at the main entrance linked to a buzzer system whereby the doors are remote unlocked to allow access.
- Name tags and protocol for visitors and child pick-up.
- Alice Training. Awareness and training are vitally important.
- · Regular armed intruder drills.
- We have trained response crisis teams in each building with personnel who have had and annually undergo restraint training.

• We have more comprehensive building and district safety plans that are updated annually.

 We have sought Title XX Grant dollars to fund Catholic Charities and ANAZAO clinical, individual, and group counseling in our schools.

- Added exterior lock boxes with master keys for law enforcement access.
- We worked with law enforcement to mark exterior doors and mark classrooms from the outside.
- MARCs Emergency Radios that link directly with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department and Local Fire Departments.
- Wayne County Sheriff Deputies regularly patrol around the school campus and stop in at varied times.
- We have also approved specific and trained law enforcement officers to carry concealed and unconcealed weapons on campus and inside buildings. Only board members and administrators are in the know of whom these individuals are. Their identities are kept under wraps for obvious reasons.
- Obviously on duty law enforcement officers can also carry their weapons.
- Since the Florida shooting area law enforcement has stepped-up their school presence.
- We have long-standing religious education programs and support prayer groups.

As always, the very best deterrent is many situations is forging and maintaining strong relationships and communications with staff, students, and parents; addressing mental health and behavioral issues, dealing with any bullying behavior immediately, as well as providing additional counseling supports for students and families as provided with existing staff, Catholic Charities, ANAZAO, families, and local clergy. Northwestern is blessed with a strong culture of faith in a very student-centered, nurturing environment. I appreciate the awareness and relationships we have of individual students and their needs - through our guidance counselors, extended counseling supports, administrators, staff-members, and community-wide.

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SCHOOL SAFETY MEASURES, continued

We have been discussing security further and we are pursuing the additional measures below:

- Purchased pepper spray gel for offices personnel, administration, and other key personnel.
- We are putting together training for additional peer training program provided by ANAZAO for recent graduates (they can become like big brothers and big sisters in this program and stay in tune with student concerns, social media, etc.).
- The Elementary began a High School to Elementary Peer Support program earlier tis year.
- Adding additional cameras in a few problem areas. Note that our security cameras feed into
 the offices and can be viewed on various electronic devices including cell phone for approved school
 officials and law enforcement.
- Researching the costs of adding an additional MARCs radio to the district office and 4 mobile MARCs radios. (we have 1 base unit in each school building currently, but adding one in the district office would be a plus as would having several Marcs mobile units). We are working to find grant funding for these.
- Educate/remind staff on the locations of fire extinguishers and other potential defensive items are located throughout their building.
- Researching software to potentially scan social media for key phrases, threats, and self-harm.
- Staff will be undergoing more comprehensive self-defense training (we have had crisis teams in place with some training)
- Expanded access of our security cameras to Sheriff Dept. Deputies on their electronic devices.
 - Purchasing additional direct intercom phones to reach the entire building in emergency.
- Add a second inside door lock to classroom doors.
- Glass breakers in every classroom (so teachers can break windows and escape through them
 if pinned down and if needed).
- Multi-directional signal booster for the MARCs radios. These are a lot of money and we
 would need to have grant dollars to purchase.
- We are searching for school safety, opioid, or DARE officer funds, if we can qualify for grant money

Other items we are discussing that have come through administrator/staff/community/parent suggestions include:

- Employ a Resource Officer who is committed to regular training with our Sheriff's Dept. or other emergency response trainer.
- Pursue additional funding for school safety that might include dollars for a resource officer.
- Adding 3M glass coating to the glass at building entrances.
- Adding alarms to some of the exits that are not the main building exits. Door alarms to all sub-entrances that can be visually seen by the office as well.
 - Add a gate to the area behind the high school to be closed/locked during school hours.

These items are unlikely, but are being discussed:

- Arming secretaries with Tasers.
- Authorize a few select administrators with CCW and additional extensive training Principals,
 Asst. Principals, and Superintendent to keep a weapon in a locked box in case of necessity.
- Metal Detectors in main entrances (with the additional cost of someone to monitor them).

- Body scan device at the main entrance of each building (\$12,000 each device and someone would need to monitor them).
- 5 gallon buckets of stones in classrooms to throw at an intruder.
- The district has concerns with arming general teachers or staff, but it needs to be a part of the discussion as well.



Human Trafficking, Runaway Situation, or Potential for Something Worse?

Captain Doug Hunter discussed this first situation in one of his Wayne County community video updates, which I would guess may still be available. It goes without saying that a better education is provided by attending our public schools and the students are safer than doing an online charter school program without the adult teacher and administrative support. This is too close to home and is a good reminder to remain vigilant and observant. It is also a good example to share with our kids. The story goes...

- A Northwestern Elementary Teacher saw a former Northwestern student (13 years-old) walking down St. Rt. 301 with an older male 22 years old
- Captain Hunter happened to be at the Middle School at a school safety assembly that morning and the teacher was aware of this so the teacher contacted the middle school secretary to notify Captain Hunter of his concern due to this oddity due to age difference and possibly truancy
- The 13 year-old former Northwestern student had actually withdrawn last fall and was in an online charter school program. She and the older man had evidently been corresponding on Snapchat
- Captain Hunter located them and put them in is cruiser and questioned them
- The male contradicted his story several times, reportedly did not share a driver' license, and would not share basic info about name, birthdate, etc.

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Human Trafficking, Runaway Situation, or Potential for Something Worse?

The story continued

- The male lived in Connecticut and had admitted to taking a bus to Wooster to meet this girl
- She was reportedly running away with him they were walking to Wooster to catch a bus to Connecticut
- Captain Hunter took the male into custody and charges were filed for contributing to the delinquency of a minor

Who knows the intent of this guy – sex trade, kidnapping, promoting drug dependency, prostitution, rape, murder??? Please read the Daily Record article below for the rest of the story.

Captain Hunter and I talked awhile that morning about another prior troubling incident that occurred last fall where two older Michigan teens were observed and caught on Northwestern campus in their vehicle. They had been texting a 14-year-old Northwestern student and met-up with her at the track behind the middle school. I happen to have known the female student and her family since her early childhood.

Our two middle school administrators brought the two Michigan teens to my office and we confronted them, copied a driver license, car license plate, then called the Sheriff's Dept. The story told was that these 16 and 17 year-old boys were headed to a party in Columbus from Michigan and "stopped by" to meet this 13 year-old girl.

Who knows what would have happened in this situation as well were it not for the observations and actions of multiple staff and our strong rapport with the Wayne County Sheriff's Dept.

We feel it is very important for our students, parents, and our community to hear of situations that could easily have ended-up poorly for young students when they are too trusting and what could have been without keen eyes and awareness of Northwestern staff and administrators! Our proximity to two interstates and nearby truck stops and a rest area do not make us rest any easier.

We all need to be vigilant and aware. We need to report as well as confront such situations that can occur anywhere in our community.

The actions of a quick-thinking teacher likely prevented the abduction of a local 13-year-old Northwestern student. Thanks to that teacher, who notified the Wayne County Sheriff's Office to a suspicious person Thursday, a crime, rooted in social media, was thwarted. I first learned about the seemingly unbelievable story at church, when one of the Northwestern parents spoke of the incident and how the teacher saw something amiss. He said a man was apprehended and arrested.

Wanting to inquire further about the possible abduction and what the story was, Capt. Doug Hunter of the Wayne County Sheriff's Office suggested I check out his Daily Update video for March 1. In it, he described the situation, which he called a "signification case."

In the video, Hunter deflects attention away from the involved department personnel. Turns out, it was him. He was already at Northwestern for a rally to promote kindness and unity. When he learned about the suspicious person, he went looking. He found a 22-year-old man walking down the street with a 13-year-old girl. The man and girl had communicated via Snapchat, Hunter said in the video. He allegedly caught a bus from either Connecticut or New York, and he was surprised he could not catch an outgoing bus from West Salem. So, the two were going to walk to Wooster and take a bus from there to somewhere.

Initially, both claimed to be 16 years old, Hunter said. It was discovered she was running away from home. The man was taken into custody for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, as he allegedly was going to provide the money

for the girl's bus ticket. The girl was returned to her parents. "A serious situation was about ready to unfold," Hunter said. He thanked the teacher for being observant and reporting it. (end of DR article)



Human Trafficking & Sexual Abuse

As parents, educators, and a concerned community we must remain vigilant in discussing with our children and maintaining awareness of human trafficking, internet and social media safety concerns, as well as potential sexual abuse. This is an important part of our health curriculum within these classes. However, in addition to this, we also should all be discussing this topic with our young people. I trust that we as aware members of our community discuss and watch the many dangers of social media and uncomfortable situations that may lead to damaging situations - including potential molesters and human traffickers.

As a school district I trust that our teachers, bus drivers, administration - all of our employees - will continue to encourage parents to be aware, to monitor their children's activities on the internet, on the phone, and in person. We also should, as parents, continue asking questions of our children and encourage our students to question anything that their instincts tell them is not quite right and to remove themselves from and mention to trusted adults uncomfortable or potentially dangerous situations.

With the data and situations and evidence so close to home here in Ohio we all should redouble our efforts at educating our students, parents, as well as our communities to be sure we all remain vigilant and aware. We do not need any more victims of sexual abuse, sexual harassment, or human trafficking. Trust your instincts and check it out if you feel something is not quite right!

This wasn't close to the @ \$1,000,000 we received last year, but we believe the district will receive at least one of the grants for the Sugar Shack, which should put us over \$100,000 for the year. However, the \$1,000,000 was a rarity due to two very large "Straight A Fund Grant" awards, which are no longer available. Due to politics Northwestern is not on the list as being eligible for the "Community Connectors Grants", which replaced that grant program. Thus we cannot even apply.

These amounts do not include the several smaller teacher grants written by several dedicated teachers as well, which they had written and received this year.

These amounts also do not include the sizeable federal entitlement funds we receive each year.

DISMAL RESULTS FOR VOUCHERS

The evidence is in, and it's not good news for vouchers. The continued push for school vouchers, which transfer scarce taxpayer dollars out of public education and into private schools, is "a triumph of ideology over evidence," according to a recent story in Long Island's Newsday. The story points to a Brookings Institution report on four rigorous studies: "On average, students that use vouchers to attend private schools do less well on tests than similar students that do not attend private schools." Information such as this is difficult to dig up. Although vouchers and charter school advocates ground their arguments on demands for testbased accountability, the Newsdayaccount reports that 70% of the largest voucher programs either don't require students to take standardized tests or don't make the results publicly available.

- Stay tuned to daily announcements about Summer PE at Northwestern High School

This usually means having a certain Grade Point Average (GPA) as well as a certain ACT score. Some specific courses have additional requirements.

- Juniors: NOW is the time to be visiting colleges! Campus visits are an excellent way to help figure out which college might be the best fit for you and to make sure you understand the application process and deadlines for admission and scholarships for that college. Once you apply (usually early fall of senior year), then you will log onto your Naviance account and request transcripts to be sent to each college you've submitted an application to.
- Don't forget! All Seniors (except Career Center & IB students) will be taking some version of Senior Seminar during the 2018-19 school year. For students not physically in the building, there will be an online Senior Seminar course for you to take during 1st semester. These courses focus on hands-on work experiences, job mentoring, and career development.

Hello from Northwestern High School,

This school year has really flown by! We will soon be proctoring this year's end of course tests at the high school. The following courses have state tests that will be a factor in meeting graduation requirements: English 9 & 10, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology, American History and American Government. The state has shifted to a single end of course test, but it still has two parts. To give the impacted students the best opportunity to perform their best we will be on a late start on test days for the non-testing students. This will allow our testing students to be in a smaller group setting. We have the test dates and times on our High School calendar, which is assessable from the High School webpage. We are doing the best we can to find ways to deal with the impact of assessment delivery, while maintaining a structure that delivers the best education that we can provide to our students.

Our students did an exceptional job with their science fair projects at the local and district level. Many of our students received recognition and honors at the district level and will advance to the State Science Day in May. Congratulations and thank you to our students, families and staff that made this possible. We also have students competing in various STEM related contests with many of them advancing to higher levels of competition.

Schedule requests have been submitted and we will be looking to create next year's master schedule. We are very proud of the fact that we have been able to maintain an impressive array of curricular offerings.

One of the issues that we have had to focus on, to a larger extent than in past years, is the number of students that have opted to go full time off campus college credit plus classes.



While we understand that this is an individual and a family decision, we strongly believe that there are considerations to be taken into account that may influence the decision. We have shifted the majority of our class offerings to a semester-based system, similar to a college or university format. Without leaving Northwestern, qualified students can earn college credits in the following classes: Writing Composition I, Writing Composition II, Speech, Literature Appreciation, American Politics, US History to 1864, Chemistry, Calculus, Statistics and/or several business course offerings. We are working to confirm a couple other classes that are impacted by changes in the CCP rules, including Music History, Music Theory and Education classes. We are continuing to offer the capstone class in both the engineering and biomedicine curriculums – Engineering Design and Development and Biomedical Innovation and will add a capstone course in Clean Energy and Computer Science. If a student has completed the pre-requisite courses, these classes may be chosen as a yearlong alternative to their senior seminar class. Seniors may also choose to participate in an Internship as a means of meeting the senior seminar graduation requirement. We will continue to look for ways to expand our offerings and provide our students with quality and innovative course offerings.

While the high school cannot be a college campus, there are definite advantages to working with teachers who are qualified to teach college classes and trained to work with high school students. While the majority of our students find success with this curriculum, regardless of where they take the classes, it is important to note that the cost of the class is charged to the family if a student does not pass a class. Having a relationship and access to the teachers at the high school reduces the risk of having a student fail a class without a parent knowing that their child is struggling or has a low grade. Taking CCP classes at Northwestern eliminates the cost and safety concerns related to travel, as well as allowing the opportunity to take other curriculum at the high school. From our schools perspective, we have a stake in having as many of our students stay and take their classes at the high school as the majority of these students are also our leaders and their absence affects the school culture.

At present, we are planning to offer at least one summer course: Physical Education. We may also have the opportunity to provide some summer on-line courses to address credit recovery needs. Further information will soon be available in our guidance office.

As we move toward May, we are looking toward many significant events. The largest of these events is the High School Graduation. On June 3rd at 2:00, in the Northwestern High School gym, the class of 2018 will be receiving their diplomas. The Class of 2018 has lived up to the strong traditions of our school and community. I always look forward to the Senior Awards Assembly, as this is a time when we get to celebrate their successes and learn more about the recognitions and scholarships they have accumulated, as well as what their future plans are. Senior Awards will be Monday, May 22nd at 7:00 p.m. and will be held in the theater. Please join us for this celebration, if your schedule allows. Underclassman Awards have been moved to Monday, May 14th at 7:30 a.m. This will be held in the gym. All parents and community members are invited to attend this event!


February may have been cold and snowy outside but inside Mrs. Dailey's computer lab it was lemonade stand weather! In conjunction with Entrepreneurship
