A note from our superintendent...

At Northwestern our dedicated faculty, staff, and administrators are engaging students, providing rigor, developing relationships and creating opportunities for every student toward attainment of their potential. These are all important as are 21st century skills of developing well-rounded, educated graduates, collaborative problem-solvers leaders of tomorrow, and all around good people.

This is my 16th year at the helm of Northwestern. I am very proud of our accomplishments and what we provide for our students as far as programs and quality. With the Coronavirus changing the very way we live and inadequate state funding there are many uncertainties as well as monumental stressors on us all. However, through the strength of families and support of our community we will move forward collectively to keep a good thing going!

As far as COVID, we have worked last spring and all summer to develop a great start to school plan with layers of health and safety measures, as well as an online option. We have created a COVID link on our district website that is dedicated to COVID school-related information. This link is a great resource for all.

As far as finances, the reliability of district finances is paramount as we move forward. It is an ongoing struggle to balance quality education with fiscal efficiency – especially when state funding that we inadequate previously is reduced even further. This is our anticipated 4th consecutive year of deficit spending. The past 16 months of negotiations to complete a new negotiated agreement and required working through dozens and dozens of individual language changes, as well as aligning our district insurance costs to the mean of area schools, has been difficult for us all. The good news is that we are near finishing it. It has unfortunately been a necessary and very painful part of improving our financial stability.

Remember, our funding deficits are no surprise, as I have been sharing these concerns for well over three years and we have been taking action, but it takes more and more belt-tightening and finding additional revenue each year to get us back on firm footing. There is evidence of five major reasons why we have run into these funding deficits: reduction in state funding (we received less state funding this past year than in 2011, for example), huge increases to health insurance and prescription costs the past 4 years, very necessary and expensive MS Roof and HVAC facility projects, major cost increases for educating students with disabilities, as well as the state CAUV recalculation, which hit low wealth, rural agricultural school districts especially hard. Below are some things we have done recently and over the past 3 years in an effort to improve our finances:

* Positions: We have reduced employees to run leaner. This summer the district has reduced or eliminated 10 full time equivalent positions (13 actual positions).

* Over the past 3 years the district has reduced or eliminated 23 full time equivalent positions, has implemented many cost reduction measures, and has been purposeful and successful at bringing in additional grant funds. Know that we have worked to make all but very few of these reductions strategically to minimize impact on students - while also reducing employees through attrition, in all but very few instances, so as to take care of our employees as well.

* The district has developed a Financial Budget Plan that includes a hiring freeze for replacing 3 vacant positions, further employee reductions in summer 2021, insurance cost changes, searching for additional grant funds, and searching for more shared services agreements among other items in an effort to bring the finances back in line and in the black by July, 2021.

 A district finance committee was created last summer and the district is establishing a working health insurance committee as well to advise on some health insurance efficiencies and costs.

* Continue efforts to influence and convince state officials including legislators and the Ohio Dept. of Education to increase school funding in a fair and equitable way so it is sufficient to support quality education for our children and support our excellent employees.

* We have a mutual interest to avoid a potential designation of Fiscal Emergency by the state of Ohio. Together all of us must continue working collaboratively to ensure "peace of mind" that a likely sacrifice of insurance changes for all employees (union, exempt, administrative ALL have the same insurance and pay the same amount) does make a difference and is very much appreciated by the school district moving forward – helping to ensure our financial solvency.

I am so very proud of our community, of our faculty, staff, administration, and outstanding Board of Education! I am proud of the academic and social success of our students. I am proud of the innovative and progressive, project-based and research-based programs & instruction we have here. I am proud of the fantastic school culture and climate we have throughout each of our buildings. A huge "Thank you" to our parents and community who support the development of our children; to our faculty, staff, and administration for our ongoing collective efforts each day, and to our 5 Board of Education Members for your leadership and direction. Together we can continue to achieve so very much!

We are all about excellence and increasing expectations at Northwestern. All of this while maintaining practical limitations. Within our Northwestern family we will continue to adapt to legislation and focus on the needs of our students. We will continue to prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!

I am always willing to listen to ideas, questions, and concerns from students, parents, and anyone in our community. It is only by asking, sharing, and participating that we can continue our important work. Please do not hesitate to contact me for any reason and "thank you" for your ongoing support. Here is for Northwestern Huskies continuing to "lead the pack!" Let's head full steam into the 2020-2021 school year.

COVID – GAAP- Finances-Deficit

These are trying times for everyone and Northwestern Local Schools is no exception. The COVID-19 situation has brought many unique and abnormal struggles of some measure to the entire world. Though I have my own opinions of what this matter is doing and why, I will keep that to myself.

Currently, as we are all attempting to adapt to the newly outlined structure of our surroundings, we still need to remember, we are all in this together. Though a cliché, it is true. In the financial aspect, many households are experiencing a crunch on income or revenue that the household typically receives; so it is for the district as well. The Board of Education and all the staff of Northwestern are pulling together in an amazing way by making every effort to deal with the burdens that have been set before us. Only as a group effort can we be successful in continuing to uphold Northwestern as the best school district to educate our students; as well as our community remaining the most desirable to reside in.

State funding has been reduced to the same amount as nearly a decade ago. This revenue is nearly 50% of the school's foundational income. Imagine being at a job since 2011 and still making the same income as you did then, no raise. For a practical application, the state funding reduction covers one payroll (1/24 of the district's annual salaries). This is what the school is functioning with. Additionally, image your paycheck being cut another 10-15%; due to real estate tax potentially becoming more delinquent – again, that is what the school finances look like, a projected reduction of 10- 15%. Moreover, the income tax that Northwestern residences pay is also likely to be reduced as the unemployment rate is slow in recovering from COVID and the projection is 10-15% reduction there as well. The school revenue was hardly enough to cover the expenses before COVID; and now, continues to chip away at the bottom-line. The result is deficit spending.

As a public entity, each year Northwestern is subjected to a financial audit by the State of Ohio. The deficit spending situation is not a surprise as the state is aware of the shortfall. In the upcoming audit for FY20 (financial records July 2019 – June 2020), Northwestern will be reporting in the accounting standard of a GAAP 'look-a-like'. GAAP is an accounting method of reporting finances and allows for the audit to opine in the audit review of the district's financial situation. This will be advantageous to continue to improve the solvency of the district's finances.

I am thankful for the finance committee we established in the summer of 2019 as well as the newly formed health care committee that are meeting to discuss practical options moving forward and continued transparency and stakeholder involvement in these two very important aspects of the Northwestern School District. As an alum of our great Husky Nation, my family will be sending the 5th generation of our legacy to the STEM preschool this fall with my grandson. So I do take the condition of our district VERY personal. We are all in this together! Let's continue to prepare our students for tomorrow's opportunities. GO HUSKIES!!!

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What is GAAP Reporting?

GAAP/OCBOA (look-a-like) is a more detailed reporting of all financial statements; especially the general fund financials. There is initial cost for conversion is approx. \$7,500 as well as annually maintenance of \$5,800 for each audit. OCBOA will constitute an unmodified opinion rather than an adverse opinion since the district is not GAAP.

From an audit standpoint, OCBOA financial statements receive an unmodified opinion with a material noncompliance finding for not being GAAP basis. Regulatory FINANCIAL STATEMENTS receive an adverse opinion with a material noncompliance finding for not being GAAP basis.

Schools are GAAP-mandated, note disclosure requirements for regulatory vs. OCBOA for schools are basically the same from most people's perspective. The addition of a Management Discussion and Analysis section before the actual statements and the structure of the statements in a "major fund" approach rather than by "fund type" is the biggest difference. As well as a budgetary basis statement for the 001 fund as a separate statement (vs. a note disclosure with final budget and actual only). In essence, the general fund is looked into more finitely.

Most of the impact of conversion will be in setup (more detailed notes, disclosures, and language etc.) and restructuring the financial statements to determine major funds and reporting. The timeline for completion would be the same since (both are cash basis). Audit reporting is due to the state via Hinkle 60 days after FYE, which is August 29 of each year. To mimic (OCBOA) the GAAP reporting entails the auditor developing and converting from 1 to approximately 5 statements on the districts financials. These reports are 55 and 71 pages in length respectively.

GAAP/OCBOA (look-a-like) will be utilized in the audit this year (FY20) reporting. Currently, Rea & Associates is assisting in the generating and overseeing that all the GAAP criteria is being followed and met so that all audit issues pertaining to GAAP reporting will be eliminated as of this FY20 audit season. There is an initial cost for the conversion of approx. \$ 7,500 as well as an annual maintenance cost of

\$ 7,500 as well as an annual maintenance cost of \$ 5,800.



OCBOA will constitute an unmodified opinion rather than an adverse opinion since the district is not GAAP, or a look-a-like. From an auditor standpoint, OCBOA financial statements receive an unmodified opinion with a noncompliance finding for not being GAAP basis. Regulatory Financial Statements (the former audit style) received an adverse opinion with a material noncompliance; the situation we have experienced before. The Treasurer began sending data to Rea & Associates for the audit documents for FY20 audit. She has a conference call with Jennifer Masters of Rea & Associates on Tuesday, August 4. The board has approved conversion to GAAP look-a-like on February 17, 2020.

Expand your Knowledge! Higher Education for Older Adults!

Ohio State University graduate-level Program 60 allows Ohio residents age 60 and older to take Ohio State University classes tuition-free on a non-credit, non-degree basis. In most cases, all they need to do is signup for Program 60 and get permission from the instructor of each class they want to take. Courses can be taken at the OSU Wooster Campus as well as main campus or any OSU satellite campus.

This semester, Program 60 had 336 students enrolled in courses at Ohio State and 792 registered participants.

What Program 60 provides older adults is not only an opportunity for learning, but also an opportunity for building relationships and emotional satisfaction in life," said Holly Dabelko-Schoeny, professor of social work at Ohio State..

If there is anything that unites people who take Program 60 classes, it is a life-long interest in learning.

Taking classes on art, medieval history, women in cinema, astronomy, renewable energy, technology, or just about any content is available. Many participants do not take the exams or write the papers assigned in class. But that doesn't mean that students aren't interested in learning the material in their classes. The social work study found that 86 percent of Program 60 students were motivated to participate in order to develop their knowledge.

What Program 60 participants get from taking classes goes beyond the usual advice for older people to keep their mind active.

"They are able to pursue areas of interest from a huge catalog of classes at Ohio State," says Dabelko-Schoeny. "It is not just exercising your brain with crossword puzzles or Sudoku. Itis about growth and development as a person." Many participants share how much they enjoyed interacting not only with their instructors, but especially with the younger students in their classes. This inter-generational interaction is a key part of what makes Program 60 successful. In fact, a study found that Program 60 participants thought the program contributed more to expanding their social network with younger generations than with other older participants in the program. What Program 60 does is provide a unique opportunity for cross-generational relationship building.

And it is not only the older students who benefit. Younger students ask for advice about a variety of experiences from participants, including about finding jobs, interviewing, life lessons, and improving their resume.

"Program 60 counters some of our societal stereotypes about how we stop learning and growing and developing intellectually and socially as we get older," Dabelko-Schoeny says. Contact Ohio State University for more information about enrolling in this unique program!

Title I & Special Education(IDEA) Annual Notifications

Northwestern Elementary School is designated as a Title I building and participate in the Title I with "school-wide" service status. Northwestern encourages active, ongoing parent involvement with their child's education, which is a parental right under Title I. Collaboration between student, parents, teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators are strongly correlated with student achievement and success.

A special Title I and IDEA (Special Education) parental planning and involvement meeting is held annually at the March Board of Education regular meeting. These meetings are held the 3rd Monday in March at 6:30PM in the High School library. This is our annual parent involvement & collaborative planning meeting for our Special Education (IDEA) and Title I programs. We discuss current programs and collaboratively plan for utilization of these funds for the upcoming school year.

Last March parents, community members, administrators and the Board of Education discussed and planned for this year's programs. Our Special Education, Title I, as well as Gifted Services were also an important part of our recently completed Strategic Plan Meeting discussions.

In addition, there are ongoing opportunities for parent meetings, open houses, parentteacher conferences, family nights, in addition to PTO involvement where Title I services can be discussed. Please contact your child's teacher, building administrator, intervention specialist or special education coordinator with questions, concerns, comments, performance data, suggestions, and/or desire for increased participation in the planning of your child's education, programs, curriculum, and communications utilizing Title I and IDEA federal funds.

• Parents are encouraged to request information regarding professional qualifications of their student's Title I funded teachers – including teacher state qualifications & licensing appropriate to grade level and subject area taught, as well as if the teacher is teaching under a temporary license in which state qualifications or licensing qualifications might be temporarily waived.

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Title I and Special Education, continued

In addition, parents have a right to request information regarding baccalaureate degree major, graduate school certification, field of discipline, and whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals, and if so, their qualifications. Our 2020-2021 federal Title I funds pay salaries for the services of 3 full time licensed instructional teachers and three licensed instructional Tutors

• Note: 100% of Northwestern District teachers are HQT (Highly Qualified Teachers), and 100% of paraprofessionals are HQ (Highly Qualified). Highly Qualified Paraprofessionals must hold an Associate's Degree, 2+ years of college, or passed the rigorous state academic assessment.

• Northwestern school district consistently strives to utilize all federal, state, and local dollars wisely with the optimal impact on student achievement. We encourage parental participation and input into possible improvements of the fund utilization – especially with Title I funds.

• All current and former migratory, transient, and homeless students enrolling at Northwestern receive the same Title I and Special Education Services as other children in Northwestern Schools as determined by school-wide programs, specialized programs, and IEPs. Northwestern serves all students and does not discriminate services based upon gender, race, or disability.

• Northwestern participates in the Tri-County ESC Preschool Consortium for both handicapped and traditional preschool children. Title I-A, handicapped preschool, and school district funds are used to support these programs.

• Northwestern has LEP (Limited English Proficient) support for LEP students. LEP students and their parents are encouraged to discuss additional needs relative to their language barrier and beyond current LEP and Title I support.

• Northwestern coordinates and integrates federal, state, and local funds that include programs required under NCLB (No Child Left Behind), bullying, violence prevention, nutrition, head start, job training, and vocational & technical education. • Northwestern consults with nonpublic and private schools regarding available title I services for schools located within the Northwestern School District and those schools outside on the Northwestern School District having Northwestern school district resident students attending.

Cafeteria News for 2020-2021

1. Everything will have to be served to your student. We will offer only one hot option each day and a few cold, prepackaged options for quick service. Please take the time to review the menus and help your student choose what they would like to eat so they will know and be ready to enter the line and choose quickly if possible!

2. We encourage the use of our PayForIt online tool for payments for meals and extras as this will also help keep the lines moving quickly and efficiently.

3. We will be sending out letters confirming our direct certified students in early August so if you would receive one of these letters please do not fill out the final form application as your students will be automatically enrolled in our meal program.

There will be an increase in some prices this year and the changes are as follow:

Student Breakfast will be: \$1.25 at all schools Adult Breakfast will be: \$1.50

Student Lunch at the Elementary School will cost: \$2.75

Student Lunch at the Middle School will cost: \$3.00

Student Lunch at the High School will remain at the cost: \$3.00

Adult Lunches for the entire district will remain at the cost: \$3.50

Milk price will increase to \$.50 and only white and chocolate milk will be served at this time.

We will still be using our keypad for student identification so please review your student's number and remember that starting in the 6th grade all students will switch over to the school assigned 6 digit number located on their schedules. Elementary students will use the last 4 digits of their SSN most generally unless there is a duplicate number. Your student will be notified if there is a change in their number.

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Mike Burkholder Memorial & Northwestern Athletic Wall of Fame

The district established the "Mike Burkholder Memorial & Athletic Wall of Fame Committee" in May, 2020 consisting of Board of Education Member Paula Abrecht, Associate Superintendent of Curriculum & Transportation Julie McCumber, High School Principal Randall Hafner, Maintenance Todd Smith, Son Jeff Burkholder, and Superintendent Jeff Layton. The committee was charged with holding memorial discussions and planning, development of a concept, then pursuing this project to honor and memorialize the leadership and accomplishments of our beloved 15-year former High School Principal Mike Burkholder. Parameters included: no financial cost to the school district, given our financial situation, as well as something special and aesthetically pleasing. The Burkholder family established the Mike Burkholder Foundation through the Wayne County Foundation for contributions to go towards this project and the Mike Burkholder Annual Scholarship (contributions can be mailed to Wayne County Foundation, Wooster). Contributions can also be sent to Northwestern Local Schools.

This is a summary of the plan as well as an update on this project.

The project includes a monument, stamped concrete area, 6 ft. textured wall, sitting area, and future athletic wall of fame. The location is adjacent to our main Husky High School Stadium entrance.

Status:

The stamped concrete, wall, drainage, planter boxes, are all complete. The memorial stone has been ordered and the design, engravings determined. Trees will be planted in October. The Athletic Wall of Fame sign has been designed and ordered. Planters will be completed in late September or early October. Benches will be set in September.

Upcoming Memorial Program:

We anticipate the memorial project being completed in October. The family anticipates organizing a public memorial program at Husky Stadium after completion – anticipated in late Oct-Nov. TBA.

The Association did award scholarships of \$400.00 each to; Rachel E. Mahr, a current Doctorate of Audiology student at the University of Cincinnati, Melissa Hill a student enrolled at Walden University in the on-line Gerontological Nurse Practitioner program, and Mary E. Baker who will be attending the Ohio State University Moritz College of Law. The Association is truly a non-profit organization. We sponsor no fund raisers. The annual banquet has to pay for its self, We do accept donations to assist with general expenses, HOF/HOH ceremonies and NWA&FA Scholarship Fund. The Scholarship fund principle is \$29,152.00 (all through donations) only the interest from this is used for scholarships. Greetings from Northwestern High School,

I would like to start by thanking the Northwestern Local School Board and Dr. Layton for giving me the opportunity to step in to the role of Northwestern High School Principal. It comes with a sense of great pride that I have the opportunity to take on this leadership role, especially in these difficult times. The unknown details of our fall restart has many of us feeling stressed. We have been working diligently throughout the summer to come up with various contingency plans that focus on not only the academic success of our students, but also the health and wellbeing of the students, staff, and community. Please continue to be patient and understanding as we continue honing the plans for our fall restart.

The start of a new school year brings some staffing changes. Anita-Jorney Gifford will be stepping into the role of High School Assistant Principal and Athletic Director. She brings a lot of administrative experience to the district, and we are privileged to have her on staff. The high school will be further utilizing the instructional skills of Mrs. Hines this year by having her teach English 10, in addition to fulfilling her librarian duties. One last staff change is the addition of John Cooke to the custodial staff. He will be taking on the role of evening custodian for the high school this year, and we are extremely excited to have him on staff. Northwestern High School will continue implementing our High Schools That Work program. HSTW is a framework for delivery of quality education at the high school level. We are always blending the initiatives of HSTW with our district's strategic improvement plan to better serve our learning community. We also continue to move forward and further develop our concept of Senior Seminar, Apprenticeships, Internships, advisor/advisee (Husky Huddle), extra help and other initiatives as we continue to strive for improvement.





High School Fees

Each year the Board of Education adopts a list of activity, handbook and instructional program fees to help offset the cost of the student handbook, consumable course materials, supplies for various course labs, etc. The activity fee helps pay for assemblies, awards, student incentives, etc. Failure to pay student fees will result in the denial of participation in extracurricular activities and/or school activities. There is also a participation fee, which is an annual \$10 fee and a \$20 Technology fee for all students. The funds from these fees will be earmarked to defray the costs of the student handbooks, chromebooks and other student related programs. Students, whose school fees are not paid in full prior to January 1st, will be denied transportation to and/or participation in all extracurricular activities. If a student owes fees from the prior year, these restrictions will be in place at the start of the new school year.

The high school has shifted to a paperless system for grade cards, with access through ProgressBook. The access to the grade cards will be denied to parents/guardians who owe fees from previous years. Upon receipt of fee payments students will have the privilege of participation reinstated. A payment plan may be established through the main office. Seniors who have any financial obligations not paid, in full, will not have the privilege of participating in the Northwestern High School Graduation exercise; in addition to withholding their diploma and academic records.

The majority of these fees can be waived if a student meets one of the following conditions:

• The student is approved for the free lunch program. (Reduced Lunch will result in a 50% reduction of fees.)

• The student is receiving assistance from Aid to Dependent Children

• The student receiving funds from the State Disability Assistance Program.

If any of the above applies to your present condition, we have a waiver of school fees form available at the high school office.

Progress Book

A wealth of academic information is available on your Progress Book account. We set up two accounts, one for the student and one for the parent/guardian. Both accounts view the same information. We have two accounts so that either party can change passwords and user names without impacting the other party. The user names and passwords should be the same as they were during the last school year. **Student Recognition**

We are very proud of our students and their accomplishments. The following are some programs that are in place to acknowledge the outstanding performance of our students.

HUSKY HIGH ACHIEVERS

HHA recognizes students that are doing well academically along with good behavior. This program has 4 levels:

GOLD - 4.0 or higher GPABLUE - 3.50-3.99GRAY - 3.0-3.49WHITE - All A's, B's or C's but less than 3.0.

Any student with a GPA of a 3.0 or higher with a D as one of the grades will be adjusted to the White card level. Any student with a failing grade is automatically disqualified from the program for the nine weeks. Students who receive any disciplinary action from the office are also not eligible. Students receive cards denoting the appropriate level. This card entitles them to take advantage of various incentives, including coupons that can be used in the classroom and food in the cafeteria. We also recognize students as "Student of the Day" AND "Student of the Month" to acknowledge the many positive things our students are doing.

HONOR ROLL

The Honor Roll at Northwestern High School is based upon a student's grades and GPA. To be on the Honor Roll you must have all A's and/or B's.

1st Honors: 4.010 – over 2nd Honors: 3.750-4.000 3rd Honors: 3.000-3.740

ACADEMIC LETTER AWARD

After 4 grade periods, students are eligible to receive the Northwestern High School Academic Letter. To be a recipient, a student must have a 3.75 rounded grade point average or higher.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

Any Northwestern High School student in grade 11 or 12 is eligible for consideration for membership in National Honor Society. NHS is more than just an honor roll. Students selected to NHS must have and maintain outstanding performance in the four pillars: Scholarship (GPA of 3.85+) Service, Leadership and Character. Qualified students may apply for membership in the fall of the school year. Selection is based upon the application and the evaluation of the applicant by the NHS High School faculty council.


<u>High School Fitness Room</u>

Thanks to the generosity of the Northwestern All-Sports Association and HealthPoint,

Northwestern High School has a well-equipped fitness room. The fitness room is equipped with 2 treadmills, 2 elliptical, 2 upright bikes, 3 recumbent bikes and a multi-person exercise station. The room is located on the Northwest Corner of the High School in Room 400. The room is available to members of the Northwestern Community from 4:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on days that the high school is in session. Northwestern Middle School students may use the equipment if accompanied by an adult. For safety reasons, we cannot allow children 11 or younger to use the equipment. Access to the fitness room may vary with the season, and the school calendar. The same policy is in place for the weight room in the Community Building. One additional rule in the weight room is that there must be at least two people in the weight room, no one is allowed to lift alone.

Track

The track is available for walking or jogging during daylight hours. We request that community use be in the outside four lanes. Many races during competition put more wear and tear on the inside lanes.

<u>Medications – Prescription and Over the</u> <u>Counter Drugs</u>

Another policy that is important to note is our policy on medications at school. To help us maintain an appropriate environment, relative to the possession of drugs, we ask that the following policy is adhered to.

Administration of Prescribed Drugs and Overthe-Counter Medicines


All medications, prescribed and non-prescribed, are to delivered and kept in the main office. They will be administered with adult supervision. Any non-food substance that is overthe-counter and is promoted for having chemically altering effects on the body is considered under this policy including laxatives, sleep aides, weight aides, etc. Drugs/medicine may only be administered to students if they are received in their ORIGINAL CONTAINER and:

1. The main office receives a written request signed by a parent or guardian that a prescription or an over-the counter drug can be administered

2. The main office receives a written request from a physician stating that a prescription drug can be administered.

The note must include the following: name and address of the student; school and class of the student; the name, dosage, and time to be administered; dates the administration

should begin and end; and the physician's phone number.





We will be using the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment (KRA) as the screener. The KRA is a tool that is used to determine an incoming kindergartener's school readiness (i.e. math, language and literacy, physical well-being, social foundations, and motor development). Beginning the first of August, the school and Nurse Bowers will be contacting you to schedule a time to complete a portion of the health screening.
