

### **Cash Balance and Future Projections**

This chart shows the actual cash balance of 2019, 2020, and 2021 as increasing with 2022 also to end with yet another surplus year. These predictions of carry-over are greatly due to the meticulous work and collaboration of the board, staff, and administrators in fine-tuning the expenses of the district; a cash balance of \$4.6 million concludes FY21.



Previously forecasted, decreased revenue for FY21 was due to COVID-19 effects. The actual revenue was not as devastating to the former budget had anticipated, largely due to the offset of expenses by additional funding and pooled resources of the community. We did it together -- THANK YOU!!!


The current forecast displays a much improved financial status for the district. Publically, I apologize for the error on my part; however, I am thankful for the positive influence of more reserve or carryover. Husky staff will (thankfully) benefit by the allowance for prospective raises in salary.

Also shown in the chart is the comparison of expenses and revenue – actual for FY19, FY20 and FY21. As well as the forecast of FY22 – FY26. Forecasting into FY26 is primarily considering historical data, reduction in expenses, and anticipated activities of state and federal funding.

We have to remain conscience that Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds will continue to aid the district's stability through 2023. At that time, some of the district's cost burdens (are) projected to return to the general and emergency levy funds to bear the expenses once again.

These two charts show the percent of the budget each fund occupies. Northwestern was able to pay off the Bond (mortgage on the buildings), which was 16.40% of the budget in FY21, nearly four years early. Due to that factor, the percentage looks different from FY21 chart to FY22 chart. FY22 does not have the Bond as a large portion of the Budget, thus impacting the percentage of the budget for each fund.





The district's finance committee meets quarterly to discuss many topics; one of those being development of a long-term plan for district's financial stability when the stimulus money goes by the way side and the burden returns to the General Fund.

This is my 17th year at the helm of Northwestern, 21st as a superintendent, 27th as a school administrator, and my 32nd year in public education. Much has changed over these many years without a doubt, but my focus has always been doing what is best for kids while supporting employees, school district, and community. This focus has continued throughout the many storms and turbulence we have faced over the years. Trying times will always come - the storms are inevitable despite proactive efforts. Leadership, trust, and relationships carry us through such times. Together, we will continue weathering the storms as well as enjoying the sunshine between the storms. We plan on having a great school year full of sunshine!

The Northwestern Board of Education and Administrators are pleased to move forward with greater normalcy for our students, staff, and throughout our schools this school year. We realize that COVID concerns linger and things will never return to "the same". We will encounter additional challenges in this regard, but we will persevere. In the mean-time we are moving forward collectively with this 2021-2022 school year with the most dedicated and very best employees at all levels. I want to thank everyone - every single employee, board member, student, parent, and community member for your support through the most trying aspects of the past 17 months of COVID and for your continued support as we strive to continue educating our students practically, effectively, and safely.

We begin the year with a traditional school schedule of 5-days a week; with our buildings paid-off, with a good carry-over balance, and with the best crew anywhere!

As far as finances, the reliability of district finances is so important as we move forward. It is an ongoing struggle in rural public education to balance quality education with fiscal efficiency. Also, the funding formula and numerous sources is difficult for the layman to interpret. However, through multi-year continued effort and planning, grant revenue, Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation rebate, better than anticipated income and property tax revenue, financial ESSER support from our townships, Federal COVID ESSER funds, multi-year cost reduction plans, and some past tough negotiations and discussions we now have a good carryover balance (see Treasurer article for more details). The ESSER funds are helping tremendously, which we plan to stretch as far as possible. The new state "Fair School Funding Formula" helps very little immediately, as the additional funding will be phased-in over a 6-year time period. However, the fair funding formula has the potential to "take over" when the ESSER funds phase out in 3 years. In the mean-time we are managing with greater efficiency and we will continue monitoring and discussing our finances.

I am so very proud of our community, of our faculty, staff, administration, and outstanding Board of Education! I am proud of the academic and social success of our students. I am proud of the innovative and progressive, project-based and research-based programs & instruction we have here. I am proud of the fantastic school culture and climate we have throughout each of our buildings. A huge "Thank you" to our parents and community who support the development of our children; to our faculty, staff, and administration for our ongoing collective efforts each day, and to our 5 Board of Education Members for your leadership and direction. Together we can continue to achieve so very much!

We are all about excellence and increasing expectations here at Northwestern. We will continue to prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!

I am always willing to listen to ideas, questions, and concerns from students, parents, and anyone in our community. It is only by asking, sharing, and participating that we can continue our important work. Please do not hesitate to contact me for any reason and "thank you" for your ongoing support. ## NORTHWESTERN DISTRICT NEWS .... Stay Informed!

### Dear Northwestern Parents and Community,

Here is a COVID summary for the start of our 2021-2022 school year. It is not written in stone, but at this point in time, with the information we have at this time, this is where we anticipate being at the start of the school year as of July 28th.

As we have seen, just as this disease has evolved, the situation surrounding it continues to evolve as well. The Ohio Dept. of Health, Ohio High School Athletic Association, collaborative discussions with other area schools and the Wayne County Health Dept., and Governor DeWine which will continue providing parameters and guidance for schools. In addition, the CDC (Center for Disease Control and Prevention), American Academy of Pediatrics, and other entities continue to weigh-in. This Northwestern plan is subject to mandated directives as well as Northwestern Board of Education revisions.

The district still plans on moving forward with a normal school year pending any new mandates and guidance from local or state health officials or Governor DeWine regarding COVID regulations. Combining layers of protection that include vaccinations, masking as needed, partitions as needed, social distancing, and clean hands/hygiene will make in-person learning safe and possible for everyone.

This is a summary of the Northwestern Schools COVID Fall 2021-2022 School Plan. It will continue to be amended as new situations and information occur. As of this time the district's plan includes:

\* All Staff to begin August 17th in the buildings per calendar and normal hours. We will be planning, learning, undergoing professional development, collaborating, and preparing for the up-coming school year prior to the return of our students' academic school year.

\* Aug. 24th begins student in-person instruction at 5 days per week. Students will return to school 5 days per week. We are planning no online learning.

\* Masks: Masks are encouraging for unvaccinated students and employees, and building visitors, however, we are not requiring masks in our buildings or on campus. Non-vaccinated people (students, staff, and visitors) are encouraged to wear a mask, face-shield, or face covering. The district will continue providing masks for those who need them.

\* Transportation: As is a universal requirement for all schools, all students and staff are required to wear a mask, face-shield, or face covering while on a school bus, with the exception of those waived for a medical condition as was the case last year.

Per the Ohio Health Dept.: "The CDC continues to require that masks be worn on all public transportation, including school buses. This requirement is regardless of vaccination status."

\* Social Distancing: We will continue social distancing to the degree possible. We are recommending 3 feet of social distancing when practical. Obviously this 3-ft. space is not achievable on school buses. We also retained our clear dividers for teachers and administrators to utilize in various locations as requested.

\* Sanitizing surfaces as well as handwashing and other hygiene protocols will continue to be stressed. We continue providing hand sanitizer and hand sanitizing stations.

\* We will maintain past quarantine protocols. However, we have the additional advantage of a unique partnership with Battelle. They will coordinate PCR tests through a collaborative grant. Their turnaround time from test to results is anticipated to be 24-48 hours with an expectation of 24 hours. We hope this will expedite any potential quarantined students' return to classes and extracurriculars. Needless to say we will also continue contact tracing protocols in partnership with our Wayne County Health Dept.





\* Visitors: We will continue minimizing outside visitors in buildings as we had last school year as well. When holding events and activities we will work to maximize for social distancing.

\* **COVID Vaccine Clinic:** Northwestern is holding free COVID Vaccine clinic (Pfizer Vaccine) dates at Northwestern ES prior to the start of school (for interested 12 and older students, employees, parents, community members. This is in collaboration with our Wayne County Health Dept. Walk-ins will be accepted, but the Health Dept. requests that we provide a number of vaccines to be ordered [please call 419-846-3151 to leave a message or e-mail me at nrws\_layton@tccsa.net) by August 5th with a number who are requesting vaccination – we are not collecting names, just maintaining a total anticipated number].

The COVID Vaccine clinics will be held 1:00-3:00 on Aug. 13 and Sept. 3 (2nd dose).

We will continue monitoring the Delta variant and other information. Simply put, we do have the all-important obligation to educate, socialize, and protect the safety of our children. We are doing our best in these regards. Our Northwestern Board of Education has the ability to make additional changes and amend this information as necessary.

As COVID continues negatively affecting our daily lives and the lives of our children, we are doing our best to continue protecting our students, employees, and families while providing the quality education that our students deserve. Together we will continue our efforts.

### Human Trafficking & Sexual Abuse

As parents, educators, and a concerned community we must remain vigilant in discussing with our children and maintaining awareness of human trafficking, internet and social media safety concerns, as well as potential sexual abuse. This is an important part of our health curriculum within these classes. However, in addition to this, we also should all be discussing this topic with our young people. I trust that we as aware members of our community discuss and watch the many dangers of social media and uncomfortable situations that may lead to damaging situations - including potential molesters and human traffickers.

As a school district I trust that our teachers, bus drivers, administration - all of our employees - will continue to encourage parents to be aware, to monitor their children's activities on the internet, on the phone, and in person. We also should, as parents, continue asking questions of our children and encourage our students to question anything that their instincts tell them is not quite right and to remove themselves from and mention to trusted adults uncomfortable or potentially dangerous situations.

With the data and situations and evidence so close to home here in Ohio we all should redouble our efforts at educating our students, parents, as well as our communities to be sure we all remain vigilant and aware. We do not need any more victims of sexual abuse, sexual harassment, or human trafficking. Trust your instincts and check it out if you feel something is not quite right!

### Title I & Special Education (IDEA) Annual Notifications

Northwestern Elementary School is designated as a Title I building and participate in the Title I with "school-wide" service status. Northwestern encourages active, ongoing parent involvement with their child's education, which is a parental right under Title I. Collaboration between student, parents, teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators are strongly correlated with student achievement and success.

A special Title I and IDEA (Special Education) parental planning and involvement meeting is held annually at the March Board of Education regular meeting. These meetings are held the 3rd Monday in March at 6:30PM in the High School library. This is our annual parent involvement

We discuss current programs and collaboratively plan for utilization of these funds for the upcoming school year. Last March parents, community members, administrators and the Board of Education discussed and planned for this year's programs. Our Special Education, Title I, as well as Gifted Services were also an important part of our recently completed Strategic Plan Meeting discussions.

In addition, there are ongoing opportunities for parent meetings, open houses, parentteacher conferences, family nights, in addition to PTO involvement where Title I services can be discussed. Please contact your child's teacher, building administrator, intervention specialist or special education coordinator with questions, concerns, comments, performance data, suggestions, and/or desire for increased participation in the planning of your child's education, programs, curriculum, and communications utilizing Title I and IDEA federal funds.

\* Parents are encouraged to request information regarding professional qualifications of their student's Title I funded teachers - including teacher state qualifications & licensing appropriate to grade level and subject area taught, as well as if the teacher is teaching under a temporary license in which state qualifications or licensing qualifications might be temporarily waived. In addition, parents have a right to request information regarding baccalaureate degree major, graduate school certification, field of discipline, and whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals, and if so, their qualifications. Our 2020-2021 federal Title I funds pay salaries for the services of 3 full time licensed instructional teachers and three licensed instructional Tutors.

\* Note: 100% of Northwestern District teachers are HQT (Highly Qualified Teachers), and 100% of paraprofessionals are HQ (Highly Qualified). Highly Qualified Paraprofessionals must hold an Associate's Degree, 2+ years of college, or passed

\* Northwestern school district consistently strives to utilize all federal, state, and local dollars wisely with the optimal impact on student achievement. We encourage parental participation and input into possible improvements of the fund utilization – especially with Title I funds.

\* All current and former migratory, transient, and homeless students enrolling at Northwestern receive the same Title I and Special Education Services as other children in Northwestern Schools as determined by school-wide programs, specialized programs, and IEPs. Northwestern serves all students and does not discriminate services based upon gender, race, or disability.

\* Northwestern participates in the Tri-County ESC Preschool Consortium for both handicapped and traditional preschool children. Title I-A, handicapped preschool, and school district funds are used to support these programs.

\* Northwestern has LEP (Limited English Proficient) support for LEP students. LEP students and their parents are encouraged to discuss additional needs relative to their language barrier and beyond current LEP and Title I support.

\* Northwestern coordinates and integrates federal, state, and local funds that include programs required under NCLB (No Child Left Behind), bullying, violence prevention, nutrition, head start, job training, and vocational & technical education.

\* Northwestern consults with nonpublic and private schools regarding available title I services for schools located within the Northwestern School District and those schools outside on the Northwestern School District having Northwestern school district resident students attending.

### Expand your Knowledge! Higher Education for Older Adults!

Ohio State University graduate-level Program 60 allows Ohio residents age 60 and older to take Ohio State University classes tuition-free on a non-credit, non-degree basis. In most cases, all they need to do is signup for Program 60 and get permission from the instructor of each class they want to take. Courses can be taken at the OSU Wooster Campus as well as main campus or any OSU satellite campus.

# This semester, **Program 60 had 336 students enrolled in courses at Ohio State and 792 registered participants.**

What Program 60 provides older adults is not only an opportunity for learning, but also an opportunity for building relationships and emotional satisfaction in life," said Holly Dabelko-Schoeny, professor of social work at Ohio State..

If there is anything that unites people who take Program 60 classes, it is a life-long interest in learning.

Taking classes on art, medieval history, women in cinema, astronomy, renewable energy, technology, or just about any content is available.

Many participants do not take the exams or write the papers assigned in class. But that doesn't mean that students aren't interested in learning the material in their classes. The social work study found that 86 percent of Program 60 students were motivated to participate in order to develop their knowledge.

What Program 60 participants get from taking classes goes beyond the usual advice for older people to keep their mind active.

"They are able to pursue areas of interest from a huge catalog of classes at Ohio State," says Dabelko-Schoeny. "It is not just exercising your brain with crossword puzzles or Sudoku. It is about growth and development as a person."

Many participants share how much they enjoyed interacting not only with their instructors, but especially with the younger students in their classes. This inter-generational interaction is a key part of what makes Program 60 successful. In fact, a study found that Program 60 participants thought the program contributed more to expanding their social network with younger generations than with other older participants in the program. What Program 60 does is provide a unique opportunity for cross-generational relationship building.

And it is not only the older students who benefit. Younger students ask for advice about a variety of experiences from participants, including about finding jobs, interviewing, life lessons, and improving their resume.

"Program 60 counters some of our societal stereotypes about how we stop learning and growing and developing intellectually and socially as we get older," Dabelko-Schoeny says. Contact Ohio State University for more information about enrolling in this unique program!

Greetings from Northwestern High School,

The start of the school year is finally here! We hope that some sense of normalcy will be restored this school year. Information regarding Covid-19 protocols are influx. Important information will be posted on our district website regarding our regulations and protocols. Please continue to be patient and understanding as we continue honing the regulations and protocols for this school year.

The start of a new school year brings some staffing changes. Dominique McGraw is stepping into the role of high school counselor. Leslie Andrews has been added to the staff as an Intervention Specialist. Katie Stull will be stepping into the role of MS/HS Agricultural Science teacher. One last staff change is the addition of Charlene Simmons to the custodial staff. She will be taking on the role of evening custodian for the high school this year, and we are extremely excited to have her on staff.

Northwestern High School will continue implementing our High Schools That Work program. HSTW is a framework for delivery of quality education at the high school level. We are always blending the initiatives of HSTW with our district's strategic improvement plan to better serve our learning community. We also continue to move forward and further develop our concept of Senior Seminar, Apprenticeships, Internships, advisor/advisee (Husky Huddle), extra help and other initiatives as we continue to strive for improvement.

#### **High School Fees**

Each year the Board of Education adopts a list of activity, handbook and instructional program fees to help offset the cost of the student handbook, consumable course materials, supplies for various course labs, etc. The activity fee helps pay for assemblies, awards, student incentives, etc

Failure to pay student fees will result in the denial of participation in extracurricular activities and/or school activities. There is also a participation fee, which is an annual \$10 fee and a \$20 Technology fee for all students. The funds from these fees will be earmarked to defray the costs of the student handbooks, chromebooks and other student related programs. Students, whose school fees are not paid in full prior to January 1st, will be denied transportation to and/or participation in all extracurricular activities. If a student owes fees from the prior year, these restrictions will be in place at the start of the new school year. The high school has shifted to a paperless system for grade cards, with access through ProgressBook. The access to the grade cards may be denied to parents/guardians who owe fees from previous years. Upon receipt of fee payments students will have the privilege of participation reinstated. A payment plan may be established through the main office. Seniors who have any financial obligations not paid, in full, will not have the privilege of participating in the Northwestern High School Graduation exercise; in addition to withholding their diploma and academic records.

The majority of these fees can be waived if a student meets one of the following conditions: • The student is approved for the free lunch program. (Reduced Lunch will result in a 50% reduction of fees.)

• The student is receiving assistance from Aid to Dependent Children

• The student receiving funds from the State Disability Assistance Program.

If any of the above applies to your present condition, we have a waiver of school fees form available at the high school office.

#### **Progress Book**

A wealth of academic information is available on your Progress Book account. We set up two accounts, one for the student and one for the parent/guardian. Both accounts view the same information. We have two accounts so that either party can change passwords and user names without impacting the other party. The user names and passwords should be the same as they were during the last school year.

### Student Recognition

We are very proud of our students and their accomplishments. The following are some programs that are in place to acknowledge the outstanding performance of our students.

#### HUSKY HIGH ACHIEVERS

HHA recognizes students that are doing well academically along with good behavior. This

program has 4 levels: GOLD - 4.0 or higher GPA

BLUE - 3.50-3.99

GRAY - 3.0-3.49

WHITE - All A's, B's or C's but less than 3.0.

Any student with a GPA of a 3.0 or higher with a D as one of the grades will be adjusted to the White card level. Any student with a failing grade is automatically disqualified from the program for the nine weeks. Students who receive any disciplinary action from the office are also not eligible.

Students receive cards denoting the appropriate level. This card entitles them to take advantage of various incentives, including coupons that can be used in the classroom and food in the cafeteria. We also recognize students as "Student of the Day" AND "Student of the Month" to acknowledge the many positive things our students are doing.

### ACADEMIC LETTER AWARD

After 4 grade periods, students are eligible to receive the Northwestern High School Academic Letter. To be a recipient, a student must have a 3.75 rounded grade point average or higher.

#### NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

Any Northwestern High School student in grade 11 or 12 is eligible for consideration for membership in National Honor Society. NHS is more than just an honor roll. Students selected to NHS must have and maintain outstanding performance in the four pillars: Scholarship (GPA of 3.85+) Service, Leadership and Character. Qualified students may apply for membership in the fall of the school year. Selection is based upon the application and the evaluation of the applicant by the NHS High School faculty council.

#### **Northwestern High School Athletics**

The following are sports and activities offered at Northwestern High School: Baseball, Football, Wrestling, Volleyball, Fast Pitch Softball, Golf (boys & girls), Soccer (boys & girls), Basketball (boys & girls), Track & Field (boys & girls), Cross Country (boys & girls), Cheer leading (football & basketball)

We are hopeful that we will be able to return to hosting athletic events without limitations on spectators. Of course, the rules and regulations for our athletic events are subject to change, as they were last year. Information about athletic events will be shared on the district website, athletic website, social media, and via the text alert system.

As a reminder, regular season tickets for our home events are \$6 for adults and \$4 for students. Spectators may purchase 5 game and 10 game event passes at discounted prices. The 5 game pass provides a savings of \$1 per event and the 10 game passes provide a savings of \$1.50 per event. These can be purchased at the ticket gate or in the main high school office during school hours.

All medications, prescribed and non-prescribed, are to delivered and kept in the main office. They will be administered with adult supervision. Any non-food substance that is overthe-counter and is promoted for having chemically altering effects on the body is considered under this policy including laxatives, sleep aides, weight aides, etc. Drugs/medicine may only be administered to students if they are received in their ORIGINAL CONTAINER and:

1. The main office receives a written request signed by a parent or guardian that a prescription or an over-the counter drug can be administered 2. The main office receives a written request from a physician stating that a prescription drug can be

administered. The note must include the following:

name and address of the student; school and class of the student; the name, dosage, and time to be administered; dates the administration should begin and end; and the physician's phone number.

Schedule pickup will be on Tuesday, August 17, Wednesday August 18, Thursday, August 19, and Friday, August 20 from 8:00-3:00. Schedules will also be available for pickup on Monday, August 23 from 10:30-3:00. Students/Parents must visit the Final Forms website (link is on the district webpage) to fill out the required paperwork in order to pick up a schedule. If you don't have internet access, there will be Chrome Books available during schedule pickup hours for you to complete the process.

All students will receive a schedule change form at the time they pick up their schedule. The form lists the course that the student is wanting to add/drop/replace. We would like to get the majority of requested changes PRIOR to the opening of school. Completed forms may be emailed or dropped off at the office. We will not be changing schedules "while you wait", so that the Student Services Office has time to look over staffing, class sizes, etc. We would like to eliminate the long lines, so please utilize the option of emailing your requests. Please keep in mind that not all requests can be approved. The request is subject to course/seat availability, and pre-requisites. All students will be expected to follow their original schedule until they have been given a new schedule by the Student Services Office. Schedule change requests may take up to 48 hours to process. Students are permitted ONE schedule change per semester.



Our students this year will be given a reward card, which can be initialed by a staff member when they are "caught" displaying positive behaviors. We will also have certain days and times where we do behavior checks for these rewards, as well. If you (or the company you work at) would like to donate coupons, gift cards, and/or money to this program, please contact me as soon as possible.

With the PBIS initiative, we have a collective theme at Northwestern this year, which is "Be the Change (that you want to see in the world)". We want to encourage students to choose to be what they want to be, which promotes positive relationships and behaviors at school, at home, in the community, and in the world. While our main focus areas will center around students being respectful, responsible, and problem-solvers, we also want to empower students to make good choices about what they want to be and how they want to behave. We want to challenge them to consider how their actions impact others, while also inspiring them to set high goals and expectations for themselves.

Our building will also continue to move forward academically, as we set learning goals for our staff and students this year. Due to the pandemic, we anticipate some learning loss with our students. For this reason, our building leadership team will be focused on increasing student literacy and numeracy skill acquisition and understanding, while also supporting the positive climate and culture of the building.

In addition to academic supports, we are also very fortunate at Northwestern to have a multitude of other support opportunities for our students and families. This year we will continue to work closely with local community agencies to provide social-emotional and mental health supports and services to our students on-campus. 
