Annual Notice of Student Wellness Meeting

Northwestern will conduct our annual Wellness Committee Discussions by Friday, April 8th.

Northwestern Schools recognize the importance of a healthy child in regard to increased capacity for learning, attendance, and overall health and well-being. Northwestern School District is committed to providing a healthy school environment which cares for the total child academically, socially, emotionally, and physically. In order to support current and lifelong health a wellness committee has been established and meets annually to evaluate various measurements and discussed ideas for continued improvement. Our wellness committee has been instrumental in securing and insuring:

- * Healthy meals and snacks
- * Expanding our Breakfast program
- * Installing defibrillators in each building
- * Installing first aid stations at locations throughout the buildings
- * Creating and supplying first aid kits for each teachers' desk
- * Securing an epinephrine (EpiPen) for each building
- * Beginning concussion protocol prior to OHSAA requiring it
- * Coordinating influenza vaccine available for all employees so as to inhibit a flu outbreak
- * Providing hand sanitation stations


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


As we begin year #2 of COVID and all the new and unforeseen obstacles, we are forced to navigate, I'd like to share where the district money comes from and how it is spent. The expenditure budget for the district is over \$20 million dollars annually with each year having grant receipts totaling over \$1 million. This year is no exception with ESSER funds from the state to aid the district with additional challenges of COVID and other extraordinary needs of the district.




This graph depicts the breakdown of salaries, benefits, reimbursements, purchased services, supplies, equipment and building maintenance needs.

Overall, this data shows Northwestern operates more efficiently with less money than that of similar districts and with that of the state average. Northwestern recently completed a performance audit conducted by the audit of state's office with only three recommendations, which according to the auditor, is completely unheard of. One of the recommendations is for the district to implement a forecasting software to enforce the integrity of the district's financial condition. Jerry Buccilla, the incoming treasurer, is bringing in that very element. I have great faith in Jerry's expertise, experience and knowledge that he will bring to the district.

This will likely be my last article, so as I close, I just wanted to share with you, my family has been part of the Northwestern community for over 5 generations, attending school starting with the one room school houses that have combined to grow into the campus of our beloved district. I want to thank you all -- the staff of Northwestern Schools, the community, and others that I have interacted with during my 9 years as the district treasurer; for the grace, challenges, lessons learned, discussions, but most of all the wonderful friendships I have gained. I want to thank you all from the bottom of my heart.

A GOOD EDUCATION IS A FOUNDATION FOR A BETTER FUTURE.

The staff at Northwestern have been working collectively on a few different initiatives throughout this school year. A number of our staff have gone through trainings in order to provide information to their colleagues. Professional development/trainings include: Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports, Ohio Improvement Process (OIP), and the Coaches Collaborative through High Schools That Work (HSTW) that has been working with Math and ELA teachers K-12.

What is Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)?

Ohio adopted a strategic plan for education - Each Child, Our Future. Each Child, Our Future explicitly recognizes the need for a positive climate in every school to support student well-being, academic achievement, and future success. Most recently, Ohio enacted the Supporting Alternatives for Fair Education (SAFE) Act, House Bill 318. It is one of the strongest state laws in the country addressing multi-tiered behavioral supports in the interest of reducing disciplinary referrals, especially for prekindergarten through grade 3 students. This bill strengthens existing requirements for school districts to implement PBIS.

PBIS is a framework that guides school teams in the selection, integration, and implementation of evidence-based practices for improving academic, social, and behavior outcomes for all students. The PBIS process emphasizes four integrated elements: data for decision making, evidence based interventions and practices that support varying student needs (multi-tiered), systems that efficiently and effectively support implementation of these practices, and continual progress monitoring to ensure outcomes are met. PBIS is not a curriculum or a one-day training. PBIS is a systems change process that requires on-going commitment in order to create effective systems for teaching and addressing academic and social-emotional skills. The Ohio Improvement Process (OIP)

The Ohio Improvement Process (OIP) includes, but goes well beyond, the traditional Plan-Do-Study-Act (PDSA) cycle. When viewed as an organizational strategy, rather than an exercise in compliance, the OIP gives districts a template through which focused and intentional action can take place. It brings educators together through collaborative team structures to learn from each other, and it facilitates communication and decision-making between and across levels of the system (district, central office, school, grade levels, content areas, classrooms). The team structures at the core of the OIP form peer-to-peer networks, giving more people a voice and allowing for the inclusion of multiple perspectives in guiding each district's journey toward organizational learning and continuous improvement. The District Leadership Team (DLT) that is comprised of teachers, staff, and administration have been working through this process that will create a District Action Plan. State Support Team 9 (SST9) has been facilitating Northwestern through the process. Goals are being discussed to support the curriculum and climate of the district. There is representation from each building in the district which will create a cohesive action plan. It is a continuous working document that guides the district.



Coaches Collaborative through High Schools That Work (HSTW)

Northwestern has also been participating in a year-long Coaches Collaborative through High Schools That Work that focuses on Literacy and Math. This is a team approach that includes administrator and teacher representatives from each building. Northwestern Literacy Coaches are leading the district and building literacy initiatives across the district. Each building has a literacy coach who has been and will continue to provide ongoing support for teachers through professional learning and modeling in the classroom. The team is building local capacity to lead Ohio's Plan to Raise Literacy Achievement, which can be found at https://education.ohio.gov/getattachment/Topics/Learning-in-Ohio/Literacy/Ohios-Plan-to-Raise-Literacy-Achievement.pdf.aspx.

Our three incredible coaches include: Angie Mc-Cullough, Kim St. Clair, and Kristen Hudson. They have worked incredibly hard with creating a District Local Literacy Plan, working through assessment data and providing additional literacy strategies for teachers in all content areas. These ladies have been chosen to present at the SREB National Conference this summer. The district received a \$2,000 grant to present and showcase the development of a district-wide literacy team with promoting literacy across all content areas from K-12th grade.

COACHES COLLABERATIVE, continued

The goal is to provide attendees with insight on forming their own literacy teams, writing literacy plans, implementing literacy coaching, and enhancing literacy in their own districts and communities

The Math Collaborative Team has worked together to build local capacity to lead a mastery Math approach that results in a student-centered instructional classroom. The teachers that have been participating in the Math training will be working on creating and implementing a Math plan that supports our district numeracy framework, identifying and delivering research-based instructional strategies and modeling effective Mathematical teaching practices through collaborative dialogue.

Featured Student Programs

Michelle Morrow, 5th grade science teacher, was awarded a \$5,000 grant for a Hovercraft project for student participation. Northwestern Elementary is very excited to bring this project to the students. All 5th grade students will learn about infrastructure, design thinking, and 21st century skills in creating unique products - energy efficient vehicles. Teams will use the 10 tips for good product design. Student teams will participate in monthly Infrastructure Design Challenges. Students will use the feedback from mentors and peers to improve their design. Each month, the teams will demonstrate their product and receive whole class feedback. In May, the student teams will participate in their final challenge facilitated by an educational consultant to design a human supported Hovercraft. Student teams will use feedback from mentors, peers, the Hovercraft experiences, and a project rubric at the beginning and end of the project to assess their knowledge and skills attainment.

ROBOHUSKIES



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What Does the New Dyslexia House Bill 436 Mean for Northwestern Local Schools?

On January 9, 2021, Governor Mike DeWine signed House Bill 436 into law, with a focus on implementing supports for all of Ohio's children. This law will apply to each local, city and exempted village school district in Ohio. The new law established an Ohio Dyslexia committee, screening measures, professional development requirements for teachers, guidelines on instructing students, and a multi-sensory structured approach to literacy certification process for teachers.

Currently the Ohio Dyslexia committee is working on the final draft of the Ohio's Dyslexia Guidance document that will outline the best practices and methods of screening, intervention and remediation for children through the use of a multisensory structured literacy program.

Students through screening that show risk for dyslexia do not necessarily have dyslexia. The overall goal of the H.B. 436 is for the early identification of risk for the provision of early intervention that can prevent or minimize the ramifications of reading difficulties such as dyslexia. At this time, according to the Ohio Department of Education, Dyslexia will not be added as a disability category for special education.

In the coming months, the Ohio Dyslexia Committee will develop a list of approved dyslexia screeners to help identify students at risk. The approved list will be communicated to the public and posted on the Ohio dyslexia supports website. Currently, there are no assessments approved to fulfill the requirements of the law. Northwestern will be required to implement the following components of H. B. 426 over a four-year period.

Is Early Entrance to Kindergarten Right for My Child?

Children who are both academically ready as well as developmentally mature are often the exceptional children for which early entrance to kindergarten is designed for when compared to other children their chronological age. Early entrance to kindergarten is designed not only for students that have the ability, but can also achieve when given new tasks, information or material. There are several questions to consider when making a determination for early entrance to kindergarten: I

- * Is my child capable of working in a classroom setting with children who are one year older than him or her?
- * What is my child's emotional regulation level?
- * Will my child become frustrated by this placement?
- * What are the possible long-term impacts for my child as s/he progresses through elementary, middle, and high school (e.g. physical size for athletics, driving later, or beginning college at a younger age)?
- * Do I want early entrance for my child as a replacement for childcare?
- * Do I understand the expectations for students in kindergarten today?

What are the current expectation of current Kindergarten students? Today's kindergarten students are engaged in a rigorous instructional program. Ohio has adopted the Common CORE for the purpose of preparing Ohioans to meet the demands of the knowledge-based economy. Please take the time to review the following information prior to referring your child for early entrance.

If a child is a good candidate after completion of an evaluation, all team members will need to be supportive of the decision of early entrance.

IMPORTANT

Very few children who are referred for Early Entrance actually meet entrance criteria. Please be sure to make appropriate child care arrangements in the event that your child is not admitted into kindergarten. It is recommended you register your child as you normally would, but let the preschool or other arrangement know that your child is being evaluated for early entrance to kindergarten.





FAQ's Regarding Gifted Services at Northwestern Local Schools?

Q: When are students screened for gifted identification?

A: Students are screened in 2nd, 4th, and 11th grade (ACT). Students are also tri-annually screened at each grade level through reading benchmarking assessment.

Q: If my child has been identified in gifted, how will I know what areas they will receive services in?

A: A written education plan is written for every student that receives services which details identified areas, subject area(s) served in, and document progress reporting twice a year.

Q: What are some ways that Northwestern serves gifted student?

A: Teachers differentiate curriculum within their classrooms for gifted students through tiered assignments, cluster grouping, independent studies, and curriculum compacting. Other services can include honors/advanced courses, College Credit Plus (CCP) courses, single,subject acceleration and/or whole grade acceleration.

Q: What are the required qualification for a Gifted Intervention Specialist?

A: A Gifted Intervention Specialist typically has to complete a set number of hours through an accredited college along with a practicum.

Q: I received a letter of no service pertaining to my identified gifted student. What does that letter mean?

A: That letter indicates that a written education plan will not be written for your student and gifted services will not be provided or monitored for them. This no service action could be due to student schedule conflict and or pre-determined agreement between parent and staff.

Q: Is it a requirement that all identified gifted students are served?

A: Gifted identification is required by law, but gifted services are not mandated. Northwestern chooses to provide services.

Q: How can I support my gifted student(s) and their education?

A: Encourage and motivate your student to take appropriate classes in their areas of identification, so they do not become bored or disengaged. Find opportunities to support their areas of interest with enrichment opportunities (summer camps, stem days, internships etc.).

Educate yourself on areas of asynchronous development that sometimes accompany students that are gifted.

Superintendent Tidbit

Northwestern requested a state Performance Audit be conducted for multiple years. The state finally came through and began the Northwestern performance audit last spring, 2021. The tentative district performance audit results are confirming of our efficiency as a school district. This has included 11 months of a team from the state auditor's office combing through our costs and comparing these expenditures with that of 3 different groups: that of area schools, like schools, and the state average. Northwestern is unusually efficient and frugal in our operations and expenditures. which is a testament to creativity, fairness, as well as strong management and leadership This Performance Audit Report will be finalized, approved by State Auditor Keith Faber, then become public record as of the February 21st Board or Education Meeting, when it will be presented by the audit team lead.

Greetings from Northwestern High School,

The school year has been progressing at a rapid rate and the end of the school year will be here before we realize it! It has been a very productive and successful academic school year thus far. In the first semester, 71% of the grades earned at the high school were A's and B's, and our high school students earned a total of 749.5 college credits through the College Credit Plus Program. These are amazing feats that represent the great efforts our students and staff well.

Spring state testing is right around the corner. We will be offering the state funded ACT test to all of our Juniors on Tuesday, March 15. This is a great opportunity for all of our juniors to take the ACT free of charge. The Ohio State End-of-Course Testing will begin on March 30 and run through May 3. During the testing window, the high school will test on Wednesdays and Thursdays. This year's tested subjects are: English 10, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology, American History and Government. If a student misses taking a test, then retest days will be made available through May 3. On Wednesdays and Thursdays of state testing, the high school will operate on a 2-hour delay bell schedule. Students not needing to test on a specific test date may arrive to school as if we were on a 2-hour delay. However, school transportation will run at the normal time on testing dates. Students needing to ride school transportation, and not needing to test, will have a monitored study hall until testing has been completed.

Scheduling for next school year begins in mid-February. We will be meeting with students by grade level to discuss the basics of our scheduling process. Then, each student will be met with individually to discuss their future goals and graduation plan to make the scheduling process more catered to each individual student's needs.

The graduating class of 2022 has been working hard to uphold the tradition of academic success at Northwestern High School. We are committed to making the senior year meaningful and a cornerstone in the preparation for all of our students' future successes. Each senior has the opportunity to work on open-ended, real-world application projects and present their work through our Senior Seminar Program, Internship Program, and Capstone classes (available in Biomed, Clean Energy, Computer Science, Engineering, and Construction pathways). It is always exciting to see the projects that our senior students produce in their senior year. I want to extend a thank you to all of the community members serving as mentors and/or sitting on the panel of judges for these seniors. The stress may be a real struggle for many of our seniors; however, they always rise to the occasion and take their developed skills with them to the next phase of their journey.

Over the years, the Northwestern learning community has found a way to continually progress the educational needs of our students. 

We ask that, whenever possible, parents and students avoid scheduling any appointments in the mornings of these school-days. The dates for testing are listed below.

- * ELA- March 30 and March 31
- * Science (8th grade only) April 20 and April 21
- * Math- April 27 and April 28

In a previous article, I mentioned our PRIDE Card incentive program. With this program, students are given a card. When teachers recognize a positive behavior, they can sign the students' cards. Once the card has been filled (10 positive behaviors), students can turn their cards in for a reward to thank them for showing great behavior. As of the end of January, we have given 208 rewards. This means that, as a staff, we have acknowledged at least 2,430 positive student behaviors. Of course, this number only encompasses the number of cards turned in thus far, with many other cards still out there in the hands of our students. We are very proud of this number and hope to see those numbers continue to rise.

Our eighth grade class are looking forward to several events. In May, the class of 2026 will finally be able to travel to Washington D.C. With their class trip being cancelled when they were in sixth grade, we are very excited for them to still have the opportunity to go. We are hopeful that the students will enjoy their trip like so many Northwestern students have before them. We will then celebrate this eighth grade class at their 8th grade Promotion on the last day of school.

As we near the end of the school-year, please take part in any of the upcoming great events we will have this spring. From band and choir concerts, to drama club productions, and spring sports, we are truly blessed with amazing and talented students who always appreciate your support at their performances. SUPERINTENDENT TIDBITS

- The district is researching and working for reduced consortium pricing through The Ohio Schools Council in pursuit of possible savings in a variety of areas. Possible areas of savings incl.: food commodities, school bus purchasing (in which we have already saved), office supplies, equipment, as well as other vendors and contractors.
- These grants are helping with costs such as purchasing equipment and supplies, professional development, sanitizing and cleaning supplies & equipment, teacher supports, student tutoring, learning software, preschool, student wellness, prevention, and much more!
- The district has secured less than anticipated cost for our final phase of the Middle School roof work. Through bidding, discussions, and negotiations we will spend far less than originally anticipated and set-aside for this project. The district is pursuing similar means in obtaining a track resurfacing cost for late fall 2022 or early spring 2023 track resurfacing work

On December 13, 2021 the members of the Northwestern FFA Chapter gathered in the auditorium at Northwestern High School for the annual winter FFA meeting.


