The success of our students is observable all around us. Through the accomplishments of our students and feedback the fine education and quality of our students is very evident. The articles within this newsletter provide evidence of our schools doing ongoing great work with our students. Whether it be fine arts, STEM programs, core foundational courses, counseling and family supports, or extracurricular activities we do take very good care of our students as well as develop and prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities and they thrive!

More-so, we have used collaboration, grant writing, and striving for efficiencies to pursue our mission within our financial constraints as best as possible. Many of our teachers, staff, and administrators have received awards for our efforts. I am grateful for our time together, continued friendship, and opportunity of continuing our working together in Ruritans, Wayne County Fair, and other ways in our community.

I look forward to working collaboratively with our two new Board Members Brad and John who bring new talents, ideas, and perspectives to our Board! Welcome aboard! As we move forward I encourage our two new board members and all five board members to collectively use their experiences, knowledge, and resources to continue working with our administrators in continuing to provide the very best education possible for our students as efficiently as possible while supporting our staff and community. I am confident that our Board will continue thinking long-term continuous improvement, systemically, and remain focused on student needs, staff needs, and community needs as we continue our mission of "Preparing our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!"

I take great pride in sharing the continued accomplishments of our students, community, and schools. The supports and relationships throughout our schools and community are unique. We must continue supporting our schools together to continue striving for even greater heights and improving issues we believe need improved. With our dedicated board, administrators, staff, and community we will continue striving for and achieving well-beyond expectations.

Difficult ongoing negotiations can and has bred some anger and polarization. Understand that as a former teacher, former union president years ago in a state-wide union, and a caring leader who makes decisions for the best of our students, staff, and school district I too support our staff. Our past and current board of education members support our staff. Since I became superintended 15 years ago I have seen to it (in collaboration with the board of education and union leadership) that our staff received a salary increase every year.

We have not gone 8 years without a raise as the cry has been in another area school district. However, with finite dollars, more than \$1,000,000 (1 million dollars) in health insurance increases over the past 3 years, and this being our 4th consecutive year of deficit spending things have come to a head. The board and I warned people 2 years ago that we were deficit spending and that the increasing health insurance costs with less state money were an issue. The district cut a lot of personnel over the past three years – and it still was not enough to eliminate the deficit spending – something has to give. The current negotiations began last spring and we have all met – the two bargaining units as well as district negotiations team – numerous times – all-day meetings, long evening meetings. We all have hundreds of additional hours of time, effort, and stress that none of us wants, yet we keep trying to settle this agreement because we all care. The difficulty simply comes down to money. Our teachers and hourly employees in the two bargaining units are working under the expired negotiated agreement as we continue meeting in an effort to update settle the terms of a new negotiated agreement. The district has continued honoring the terms of the past agreement. Employees, teachers, hourly employees, exempt employees, supervisors, and administrators all follow these same terms/rules, all receive their individual contracts, all receive step increases for years of service per the agreement, and all continue with the same health insurance plan, premiums, and co-pays until a new agreement is reached. In other words “business as usual” while we continue working to resolve the agreement. Within our Northwestern family we will continue to focus on the needs of our students. We will work through the challenging finances we face together. We will continue to pursue grants and other revenue sources and reduce costs to live within our means as we continue moving forward together. I love our kids, love our staff, and love our community.

These are difficult times. There is more misinformation in the world and in this nation than ever before. There has been a polarization of people across our great nation. Here in our own community we must remain collegial and maintain

respect and not allow negative influences from outside to poison reality. This means speaking with integrity, truth, and face-to-face discussions rather than attacks and innuendos through rumor or social media against individuals or those generalized, inflated comments fueled by anger rather than facts. I ask individuals to respect one another and refrain from over-personalizing issues and disagreements that arise, listening to false rumors, speak up for honesty and what is right, and trust only the facts as we move forward collectively as a school district and community. We have so many good, caring people here – we just have to keep working together in continuing to do what is right for our children. I love our kids, our staff, our schools, and our community – as do we all. Stay warm and safe through the remaining winter months as we all look forward to spring and warm weather! As always, I am willing to listen to ideas, questions, and concerns from students, parents, and anyone in our community. It is only by asking, sharing, and participating that we can continue our important work. Please do not hesitate to contact me for any reason and “thank you” for your ongoing support.”

EMERGENCY DELAY OR CANCELLATION DAYS

With the severely cold weather and winter remaining we would like to remind parents about our delay and cancellation procedures. When our school buses travel over 1,436 miles each day in our 94 square mile school district, picking up students it is imperative that the roads are safe to travel. **The safety of students and drivers is the primary issue when considering whether to cancel school.**

If conditions are questionable regarding student and bus safety, both the Northwestern Transportation Mechanic Jonathon Wellert and Northwestern Superintendent Jeff Layton drive the roads prior to 5:00 a.m. - communicating with each other – in order to make the final decision before 5:30 a.m. At 5:30 many of our dedicated bus drivers have already begun their routes on poor weather days. The Superintendent also listens to weather forecasts and confers with other area school district superintendents - all of who also do assessments of their road conditions. A decision is made to delay or cancel school if it is unsafe for students and/or unsafe for bus travel. Since Northwestern stretches so far north-south we may not always make the same decision as other school districts. This is because we are concerned with Northwestern students first and foremost. However, we also have an obligation to also fulfill our mission of providing an excellent education for our students.

Know that our buses do have heaters and they also drop-down chains. We installed the chains for a reason – so we can fulfill transporting our children to and from school safely. Trust our dedicated and experienced bus drivers to do this with the safest equipment.

When the Wayne County Sheriff issues a Level 2 weather warning, telling motorists to drive only if it is an emergency, school is automatically cancelled. However, sometimes these announcements do not come before announcement of school closing has to occur. In addition, often the road conditions change quickly and dramatically – sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse - between the time of the final decision at 5:30 a.m. and the time MS and HS may begin with a 2-hour delay. As most people are aware the superintendent has made the extra effort to make the decision between 5:00-5:30 and closer to 5:00am if at all possible depending on the conditions and situation.

Information on school closing is available and most accurate by registering for communications. Parents, students, and community members can register for text alerts and/or e-mail alerts through our website.

The school text and e-mail alerts systems are the most efficient and immediate as far as information,

please register if you have not. Additionally, district phone recordings, website, twitter, instagram, facebook, as well as radio station WQKT are the quickest to post the information. Also, calling the district or individual school building phone numbers and listening to the recorded message on our automated phone system is an option. Announcements are also made through local radio stations WQKT and WNCO as well as TV stations WEWS (Channel 5), WKYC (Channel 3), and FOX WJW (Channel 8). Television stations have between a 15-minute and 30-minute lag time before the information is posted an occasionally do post inaccurate messages or their systems become overwhelmed. Also, following a delay a decision to close is announced by 8:00 a.m. at the very latest. Otherwise, assume that we will remain open.

Annual Notice of Student Wellness Meeting

Northwestern will conduct our annual Wellness Committee Discussions by Friday, April 10th.

Northwestern Schools recognize the importance of a healthy child in regard to increased capacity for learning, attendance, and overall health and well-being. Northwestern School District is committed to providing a healthy school environment which cares for the total child academically, socially, emotionally, and physically. In order to support current and lifelong health a wellness committee has been established and meets annually to evaluate various measurements and discussed ideas for continued improvement. Our wellness committee has been instrumental in securing and insuring:

- Healthy meals and snacks
- Expanding our Breakfast program
- Installing defibrillators in each building
- Installing first aid stations at locations throughout the buildings
- Creating and supplying first aid kits for each teachers' desk
- Securing an epinephrine (EpiPen) for each building
- Beginning concussion protocol prior to OHSAA requiring it
- Coordinating influenza vaccine available for all employees so as to inhibit a flu outbreak
- Providing hand sanitation stations

These individuals – whose names only board members, administrators, and law enforcement know – are the only individuals, other than our SRO Deputy Adam Chellis, Wayne County Sheriff's Dept. officers, permitted to carry weapons on our campus.
- We held a district-wide mock tabletop emergency drill recently which involved emergency management, New Pittsburg Fire Dept., Wayne County Sheriff's Dept., building administrators, 9-1-1 Dispatchers, students, a teacher, superintendent, and others. Good discussion and awareness of how to handle various situations.

“Superintendent Tidbits”

• I was informed last October that Northwestern is receiving the \$46,000 Title XX Grant again this current School year. I continue pursuing other grants as I discover them and as able throughout the year. We have bene fortunate to have received over \$1,000,000 in grants last year and very close to that two years prior. Over the past 3 years Northwestern has been awarded well over \$2.4 million in grant awards. The average of schools our size is less than 1/10 of that amount. Our major funding sources continue to be (in this order): 1. State School Foundation funding 2. Income & Property taxes 3. Incoming student open enrollment 4. Grant funds (sought & written locally) 5. Federal Program CCIP funds 6. Weighted CTE (Career Technical Education) 7. Incoming Peterson Scholarship funds. #3, #4, #5, #6, #7 are diligently sought after and brought in through our efforts and I deal directly in pursuing and monitoring.

Northwestern Transportation Department

Our Bus Drivers and Van drivers at Northwestern Local Schools are dedicated individuals that work hard on a daily basis to ensure the safety of your children getting to and from school. Northwestern Transportation Department transports on an average 1000 students. Drivers work continuously on their routes and communicate daily with administrators as needed. They have been working hard with our elementary school which has provided excellent team work with positive behavior incentives for students riding the bus.

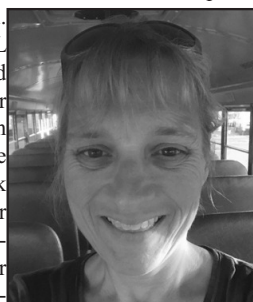
The goal of pupil transportation is to provide safe, reliable and dependable service for school children. The Ohio Preservice School Bus Driver Training Program is the method by which Bus drivers are trained to provide such services. Ohio law requires new school bus drivers to attend 15 hours of classroom training, and drivers completing a 6-year recertification are required to attend 9 hours of classroom training.

In Ohio, we place great importance on the work of our On-Board-Instructors (OBI). These dedicated professionals are the key to our success in implementing the best practices and techniques that are part of our Preservice Program. OBI's must ride with their preservice instructor to demonstrate their driving and pre-trip skills. Our goal was to clearly establish that our OBI's are indeed the 'best of the best', and had a solid grasp on the skills they are teaching our bus drivers.

Northwestern Transportation Department is very excited that **Johneen Gordon** will be working with our dedicated bus drivers and Van drivers. Johneen passed with flying colors and has already worked on recertification with

bus drivers and in the process of working with individuals to obtain their CDL. This allows our district to train prospective drivers in a timely and efficient manner. Johneen started with Northwestern Local Schools in October 2005 transporting students via Van. She received her CDL in March 2006 and had been a Bus Driver with Northwestern Local Schools for the past 13 years. Thank You Johneen for your dedication in providing the BEST for our transportation department.



Curriculum Update

Throughout the school year teachers, staff and administration continue to work collectively on their content area of instruction. From the start of the school to the point that we are now in the school year, content, building and grade level teams collaborate to provide the best instruction to their students. Curriculum Alignments, Item Analysis and area of improvement have been a focus. Administration has been working with their building leadership teams looking at the three- year trend of data and finding correlations back to the classroom on the areas of strength and growth.

Teachers have a number of items that they take into consideration when planning out their curriculum maps for the school year. It is a continuous working document year to year, even month to month. Our teachers are amazing on working through these curriculum maps while continuously finding resourceful tools, appropriate assessments and overall design of lessons day to day that meet their student's needs.

It's a superior task to meet the state standards and maintain the authenticity of your everyday delivery of instruction. As you walk through each of our buildings at Northwestern, an individual will see this happening on a daily basis.

Northwestern Local Schools are working with a Math Coach through the Summit ESC and Tri-county ESC and an English Language Arts Coach through HSTW. These individuals are considered experts in their content area. During the district's delayed starts and other days that are spaced throughout the school year, our teachers have an opportunity to work with these individuals one to one or as a department. During these sessions there is discussion that involves, how are we interpreting the data, what changes to instruction to I need, and are using the same vocabulary across all content areas? Also, what is the process that we are using to breaking down questions within a lesson that that meets higher levels of cognitive demand? The coaches talk through strategies, tools and delivery of instruction with the teachers. These coaches visit many districts throughout Ohio and what I hear from them most often is that Northwestern is such a great place to work. They compliment our students and staff on a regular basis. The teachers are determined to work with them and truly implement the strategies and tools that are discussed with them. What a testimony to our staff that truly want the BEST for our students.

An area that the district is working on in each building is everyday Vocabulary across content areas. While working with our ELA Coach, we have learned different strategies in teaching the critical vocabulary to our students. Words have Tiers (1,2,3) and when teaching vocabulary there are four essential components. Researchers suggest that students are taught approximately 300 words per year through direct instruction. Teaching academic language increases the ability for students to learn about 50,000 words by high school graduation. This is based on the brain research done by Marilee Sprenger that has written a number of books pertaining to teaching vocabulary.

The Math Coaches have taught in the classroom with teachers. They have conferenced

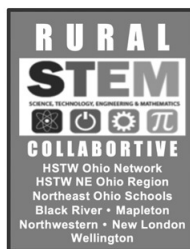

one to one with teachers working on depths of mathematical questioning and tools used in the classroom.

They have also brought to Northwestern another way of looking at the delivery of math on a daily basis. As Coach Mike states;” we have narrowed everything down to individual learning targets that need taught and assessed in silos. We move from topic to topic without connectedness or time for mathematical play. We fly through a scope and a sequence that undoubtedly leaves young people scrambling to recall information during an outside audit.” Mike was speaking on Schools across the United States and their math journeys. These two coaches have been a great fit with our Math Department this school year and look forward to working with them in the future.

“Superintendent Tidbits”

- Innovative Workforce Industry Credentials Grant Application involves \$34 million in state workforce credentialing funds that are expected to provide up to \$1,250 for each qualifying 12-credential outcome earned by students. This is a planning/scaling-up grant with the commitment for students to earn the 12 or more hours of industry credentials in the 2020-2021SY. The budget amount should be based upon the total # of students we anticipate earning the credentials X the \$1,250. I would think this total - as well as any pushing for additional equipment, supplies, software costs we would anticipate needing scaling-up for this goal should be provided for in this grant. I began this grant application in Dec., but will have lots more to do over the next two months!

Northwestern is perfectly aligned to pursue this! Mental health & Recovery Board will be receiving state prevention grant funds that are to be used in collaboration with schools. \$18 million in K-12 Prevention dollars through our MRDD Partners (trauma-informed care, mental health, resiliency, etc.). Matt Beres and I participated in a webinar prior to Christmas Vacation regarding these funds and we began the self-assessment earlier this month. These funds are focused on mental health, trauma informed care, behavioral needs, resiliency, social emotional learning, professional development, peer-to-peer, etc. for all students. This process has already begun with a half-day meeting in January in which Principals, Curriculum, Special Education, and Pupil Services people with me and we went through this self-assessment together.

Districts are working on our K-12 self-assessment to: 1. identify needs 2. inform 3. determine how much is needed and develop a services delivery model (funds could come directly to the schools in combination with direct funds through providers) 4. Follow with a plan of action for providing best practices prevention services.

- Northwestern has been selected for participation in the Education Department's System of Tiered E-Plans and Supports (ED STEPS) pilot project. Over 130 districts applied for consideration to be part of this pilot. A diverse group of 40 districts were selected to partner with the Department to learn how to begin three-year planning and design, develop and roll out the ED STEPS systems components. This is an exciting initiative that should provide us greater flexibility with federal CCIP grant funds!

- STEM Preschool expansion. The district is considering approval to expand our preschool program from 2 classes to 3 classes. The program has been sustained through grants, donations, foundation contributions, and parent fees and whether 2 or 3 classes are anticipated to run at a cost neutral for the 2020-2021 whether 2 or 3 classes.

Hello from Northwestern High School,

As time rolls on, we can be assured that winter will give way to spring – bringing with it the Spring Assessment season. Our students in grades 10-12 will be taking End of Course tests if they are enrolled in any of the following classes: English 9, English 10, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology, American History and Government. The end of course tests will be from April 14 through May 6 with adjusted bell schedules on Tuesdays and Wednesdays during that stretch of time. Students will take these assessments and need to accumulate at least 18 points across these tests, as a graduation requirement. There will be retest opportunities, where necessary. Students in grade 9 will have no assessment in English 9 and possibly no assessment in Geometry.

We are very proud of the body of work completed by our students in senior seminar, internships and capstone classes. Thank you to all community members who took the time to serve as mentors or to sit on the panel during presentations. It is a huge endeavor, but is very worthwhile.

We have many students who are participating in the College Credit Plus program. We will continue to have offerings in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Business, Music and Agricultural Science. Please contact me or our Student Services Office to learn more about these opportunities. While we have a small population of students who take all of their CCP classes on a college campus, we have created a scenario where our students can have the best of both worlds and not have to sacrifice time and money traveling to the campuses or sacrifice the social experience of the final years in high school. We will be holding a meeting to discuss CCP classes offered at Northwestern in the near future. We will announce the date and time once that has been established.

A reminder to all community members; Thanks to the generosity of the Northwestern All-Sports Association and Northwestern High School Physical Education classes now has a well-equipped fitness room. The fitness room is equipped with 2 treadmills, 2 ellipticals, upright bikes & recumbent bikes. The fitness room is located on the Northwest Corner of the High School in Room 400. The room is available to members of the Northwestern Community from 4:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on days that the high school is in session. Northwestern Middle School students may use the equipment if accompanied by an adult. For safety reasons, we cannot allow children 11 or younger to use the equipment. Access to the fitness room may vary with the season, and the school calendar. Community members have access to the track during daylight hours. Please restrict your use to the outside four lanes to reduce the wear on the inner lanes, which have more use during athletic events. The free weight facility in the community building is also available to community members, with restrictions. During the school day it can be accessed by signing in and getting a key from the board office. If we have a physical education class using the facility, they have priority. These classes are typically scheduled from 7:20 to 9:32. After school hours the weight room is generally utilized by athletic teams, making the facility unavailable. If the board office is closed and the athletic teams have finished their practices, access to the weight room may be achieved through a coach or Northwestern staff member who has a key, but they must be on the premises with you as a supervisor. These tightened restrictions are a result of trying to be good members of the community while balancing issues related to safety and liability.

We have so many people that invest so much for our students and children. Thank you for your continued support as we continue the work of "Preparing our Students Today for Tomorrow's Opportunities".

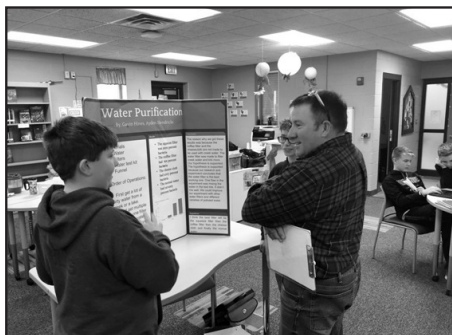

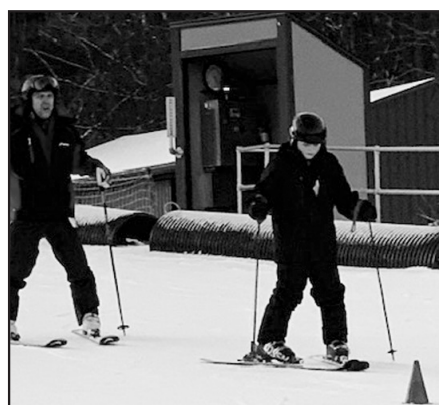

We want to congratulate and recognize the hard work and effort by our third grade students. Our 3rd grade students have taken the fall AIR Assessment and received their results. If you have a student in 3rd grade, this is a great time to sit down and speak with them about their results. Third grade students must score at least a 683 scaled score or a 46 sub score to meet the promotion score to move on to fourth grade. Students who have not met the promotion score will have several more chances to achieve a passing score before the end of the school year. For more information on this assessment, visit the Ohio Department of Education website and look up Third Grade Reading Guarantee.

State testing is right around the corner for grades 3-5. State testing will begin in April and finish early May. You can view and help prepare your son or daughter for the tests at <http://oh.portal.airast.org/ocba/students-and-families/>. As the dates get closer, more testing information will be communicated with students and parents.

As a reminder, our students are utilizing a program in and out of the classroom called Moby Max. Moby Max allows for individualized lessons, differentiation and fill in the learning gaps for our students. Students can access Moby Max at home and school 365 days a year. This program has been utilized throughout the building for all subjects for our students to achieve success and raise their achievement scores. For more information about the program visit www.mobymax.com. We are excited about a new initiative to promote reading called "Tucked in Tuesday." Each Tuesday by 7 PM, a video will post of a different Northwestern staff member reading a bed time story. We hope you enjoy!

The one type of cap we are asking you to separate out when you collect is any COKE CAP (These types of caps are worth \$.05 when donated to a school or a non-profit organization). Thus far, this year, we have raised over \$850, primarily five cents at a time. Here are some IMPORTANT tips for you to remember if you are collecting caps or other recyclables for us. -

PLEASE RINSE any recycled can, bottle or cap items until clean

- The recycling center remains open throughout the week behind to the school for plastics, glass, aluminum/tin cans, cardboard and paper products (please save Coke codes from 24, 15, and 12 pack boxes... see below). **PLEASE DO NOT THROW YOUR TRASH IN THE RECYCLING BINS!!** If you need help with putting things in the bin, there will be a 5th grade student with a parent present every Saturday morning from 9-noon to assist you.

- COKE CAPS are worth 5 cents each

- Coke 24, 15 and 12 pack boxes have COKE CODES (in a square) on the inside of the box worth \$.30, \$.23 and \$.15 respectively.

- DASANI water 24 packs have a block square on the bottom of the plastic wrap that is worth \$.30

Recently, the Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Recycling District allowed us to borrow recycling receptacles for both the middle school and high school gymnasiums. If you attend athletic events and enjoy a Coke beverage, please use these to dispose of your bottle. You may leave the lids on and we will sort through them when we remove the Coke caps. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT TRASH INTO THE BOTTLE!!**

"Superintendent Tidbits"

Northwestern has been so blessed to have written and been awarded two different Federal Expanding Opportunities Grants stretching over a three-year period that began last year and concludes this 2020-2021 school year. One was \$425,000 and the other \$275,000 – for a combined \$700,000. We are one of only 17 School Districts in Ohio to receive these funds from the first grant of the 32 which applied, by far the smallest school district, and one of less than 10 schools who received both grants. A round three grant is anticipated to come out this spring, for which we will certainly apply as well. These grants are entirely funding Northwestern and are not a multi-district collaboration, so all funds remain local for our students, although they are restricted in how the funds can be spent – on CTE, STEM, CCP, distance learning, technology, and other select 7-12 programs.

• United Way After School Grant of \$10,000 was submitted. I completed this and submitted over Christmas Vacation.
