As storm clouds subside, we all need to recall the old adage, "April showers bring May flowers". Such is true in the new Fair Funding Formula that the state has developed for all Ohio schools. It is designed to economically construct fairness to all districts like that of Northwestern that has struggled with no increase in state aid for nearly a decade.

The state has advised the district we will could see nearly \$1.8 million increase by 2027 – Outstanding! However, being a country girl, a lifelong resident, and alumni of the district I am of the mindset "don't count your chickens before they're hatched" this statement works in the way we are anticipating the aid in funding. However, I have never felt more hopeful than I do this time. The drawback is that it is far enough into the future that it does not aid the district right now.

With COVID happening, the funds to assist the district, (as it has for each of us in the Federal Stimulus), have been filtering in to recalibrate the current financial condition of the district. This monies will be instrumental in 'fortifying our walls' until help arrives. The district has been figuratively 'tightening its belt' so we can muster through the hard times.

We have worked hard to further reduce our costs and manage more efficiently; we are forecasting the future condition to note this reprieve in expenditures. This table shows a comparison of last year as of March (2020) to this March (2021) actual expenses.

Northwestern has been listed as a "smart school" district in the National Knowledge Works "smart schools" efficiency study.

Several years back Northwestern received the highest marks on the American Progress "Efficiency Study". This national study of public school efficiency measured school district per pupil cost to educate against student productivity.

After 5-years of our comprehensive cost reduction and revenue seeking efforts on controlling the deficit spending the district has righted the ship in regard to balancing our budget. We anticipate well over a \$2,000,000 carryover at the conclusion of this school year! The major elements are the changes of employee insurance, surgical staffing realignments and reductions (including an administrative position reduction), continued successful grant writing, collaboration with partner agencies and public entities, and improved financial revenue outlook. Treasurer Lesa Forbes will share much more with our summer newsletter and on our website as we come to the end of this fiscal year the end of June. The district website has much information – financial, prior newsletters, and so much more information. Please pay us a visit and remain knowledgeable. Make no mistake, the Ohio Senate still has an obligation to adequately fund our schools. Our senators have an obligation to our children to pass the "Fair School Funding Formula" and it's proposed 6-year phase-in.

Our community has so much to be grateful for - our families, friends, and wonderful school system with great facilities, which we recently paid off 3.5 years early! We must take care of our buildings that we paid for. In our schools we have extraordinary teachers and support staff, wonderful administrators, and wise board members. But we need heat and we need dry roofs, insulation, and classrooms. We need to properly maintain our buildings or it will cost far more down the road. We also have numerous support organizations which help our mission such as Ruritans, All Sports, PTOs, Music Boosters, Alumni & Friends, FFA Alumni, etc. Without our community of leaders working collaboratively and exhibiting transparency we would not be serving our students to the fantastic degree that we are!

I take great pride in sharing the continued accomplishments of our students, community, and schools. The supports and relationships throughout our community are unique. We can take great pride in our schools and together we can continue to strive for even greater heights. With our dedicated administrators, staff, and our supportive community we will continue striving for and achieving well-beyond expectations – in an efficient manner.

We are all about excellence and increasing expectations at Northwestern. Within our Northwestern family we will continue to focus on the needs of our students. We will continue to prepare our students today for tomorrow's opportunities!

\* By refinancing our bond at a lower interest rate with the balloon payment terms we put in place in 2011 the district saved our taxpayers over \$266,000 in interest over the last 13 years of the loan!

\* By retiring the bond early we will save taxpayers more than \$21,000 in interest!

\* Now we all benefit!

#### Facts:

\* We have been conservative in our expenditures

\* We have proactively worked to reduce this bond debt

\* The district refinanced our bonds at a lower interest in 2011

\* We elected a balloon payment schedule when refinancing in 2011. The balloon refinance and amortization with increasingly larger payments, followed by smaller payments the last years of the bond

\* Our Emergency Levy has also be reduced - from the original 2.8 mils to an effective 2.5 mils this year (2021)!

#### Expand your Knowledge! Higher Education for Older Adults!

Ohio State University graduate-level Program 60 allows Ohio residents age 60 and older to take Ohio State University classes tuition-free on a non-credit, non-degree basis. In most cases, all they need to do is signup for Program 60 and get permission from the instructor of each class they want to take. Courses can be taken at the OSU Wooster Campus as well as main campus or any OSU satellite campus.

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What Program 60 provides older adults is not only an opportunity for learning, but also an opportunity for building relationships and emotional satisfaction in life," said Holly Dabelko-Schoeny, professor of social work at Ohio State.. If there is anything that unites people who take Program 60 classes, it is a life-long interest in learning. Taking classes on art, medieval history, women in cinema, astronomy, renewable energy,

technology, or just about any content is available.

Many participants do not take the exams or write the papers assigned in class. But that doesn't mean that students aren't interested in learning the material in their classes. The social work study found that 86 percent of Program 60 students were motivated to participate in order to develop their knowledge.

What Program 60 participants get from taking classes goes beyond the usual advice for older people to keep their mind active.

"They are able to pursue areas of interest from a huge catalog of classes at Ohio State," says Dabelko-Schoeny. "It is not just exercising your brain with crossword puzzles or Sudoku. Itis about growth and development as a person." Many participants share how much they enjoyed interacting not only with their instructors, but especially with the younger students in their classes. This intergenerational interaction is a key part of what makes Program 60 successful. In fact, a study found that Program 60 participants thought the program contributed more to expanding their social network with younger generations than with other older participants in the program. What Program 60 does is provide a unique opportunity for cross-generational relationship building.

And it is not only the older students who benefit. Younger students ask for advice about a variety of experiences from participants, including about finding jobs, interviewing, life lessons, and improving their resume.

"Program 60 counters some of our societal stereotypes about how we stop learning and growing and developing intellectually and socially as we get older," Dabelko-Schoeny says. Contact Ohio State University for more information about enrolling in this unique program!

Greetings from Northwestern High School,

The 2020-21 school year is quickly nearing an end, which means the busiest time of the year is upon us. The balancing act of administering state tests, organizing course requests and schedules for next fall, preparing for awards ceremonies, spring concerts, final exams, and graduation are all time consuming and difficult tasks in a normal year. Without the help of our students, staff, parents, and the community, the process would be nearly impossible this year. Thank you to everyone that has helped the school district navigate a very difficult year!

All of 2021-2022 student course scheduling requests have been submitted. We are diligently working on creating next year's master schedule, which is always a long and arduous process. We are very proud of the fact that we have been able to maintain an impressive array of curricular offerings. The most significant factor in our ability to continue to offering such a variety of curricular options is the willingness our high school staff to take on extra duties and responsibilities for the betterment of the learning environment for all students.

We continue to focus on creating opportunities for our students to remain on our campus and have access to a significant number of CCP classes. Without leaving Northwestern, qualified students can earn college credits in the following classes: College Writing I, College Writing II, Speech, Literature Appreciation, American Politics, US History to 1864, Chemistry, Intro to Biological Sciences, Microbiology, Calculus, Elementary Statistics, College Algebra, Trigonometry, Music History, Teaching as a Profession, multiple Ag Science courses, and several business course offerings. We understand that taking CCP course work is an individual and a family decision, we strongly believe that there are considerations



to be taken into account that may influence the decision. While the high school cannot be a college campus, there are definite advantages to working with teachers who are qualified to teach college classes and trained to work with high school students. The majority of our students find success with this curriculum, regardless of where they take the classes; however, it is important to note that the cost of the class is charged to the family if a student does not pass a class. Having a relationship and access to the teachers at the high school reduces the risk of having a student fail a class without a parent knowing that their child is struggling or has a low grade. Taking CCP classes at Northwestern eliminates the cost and safety concerns related to travel, as well as allowing the opportunity to take other curriculum at the high school. From the perspective of the high school, we have a stake in having as many of our students stay and take their classes with us. A majority of the students taking CCP course work are also our leaders in the learning environment and their absence affects the school culture.

Northwestern High School is continuing to offer capstone classes in agricultural business, biomedicine, clean energy, computer science, and construction technologies curriculums. If a student has completed the pre-requisite courses, these classes may be chosen as a yearlong alternative to their senior seminar class. Seniors may also choose to participate in an Internship as a means of meeting the senior seminar graduation requirement. Students can also be exempted from Senior Seminar if they successfully complete the following CCP classes: College Writing I, College Writing II and Speech Communications. We will continue to look for ways to expand our offerings and provide our students with quality and innovative course offerings.

We will be offering online Financial Management as a summer school course again this year. There is a course fee associated with Financial Management. The fee for the course will be added to the 2021-22 school fees at the beginning of next school year. The deadline to sign up for this course is May 14. Please contact Student Services to be added to the course.

Northwestern High School will also be offering credit recovery summer school course work. Students who failed a graduation requirement Math and/or ELA course(s) this school year, will be offered the option to make up these credits over the summer. We will be utilizing APEX, our online credit recovery program, while providing in-person curricular support two days a week throughout the summer. Since the combination of 4th quarter grades and final exams count as 34% of the overall grade in a course, many students still have the opportunity to pass classes they have previously been underperforming in. This also makes it difficult for the school to accurately identify which students will need summer school credit recover. Therefore, additional details about summer school will be sent to parents closer to the end of the school year.

Speaking of final exams, Senior will take their exams on Tuesday, May 18 and Thursday, May 20. We will remain on the normal bell schedule on these dates. Wednesday, May 19 is a remote learning day and is a make-up/reschedule date for seniors to take their final exams if they are unable to do so on Tuesday and/or Thursday.

Final exams for the underclassmen will be Monday, May 24 – Wednesday, May 26. The high school will operate on an adjusted bell schedule. Students will take their odd period (1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 7th periods) tests on Monday, May 24 and their even period (2nd, 4th, 6th, and 8th periods) tests on Tuesday, May 25. Wednesday, May 26 is a designated make-up/reschedule date for any students unable to complete their exams on Monday or Tuesday.

The format for final exams will be open. Students do not need to come in until their first exam each day and may leave after their final test each day. However, our school buses will be running on their normal schedules. All classes, excluding study hall, will be having a final exam or culminating activity. If a student has an exam, study hall and then an additional exam they must stay the entire time.

#### Superintendent Tidbit:

#### Finances:

The district has realigned positions for greater efficiency and as part of our ongoing cost-reduction plans. We have reduced a number of paraprofessional, custodial, and teaching positions in some areas where numbers did not support the need, while adding some new teaching positions in focused high needs areas supporting student. We have also decided to reduce an administrative position and reorganize our administrative personnel. Each of the past 5 years we have put together an annual comprehensive plan for cost Reduction Measures and efficiency. Many items are non-personnel, but most have unfortunately been personal – because we are in the people/relationship business and more than 80% of our costs are personnel. Due to financial constraints we were forced to reduce several posi tions and we incorporated numerous cost reduction items which are anticipated to reduce the projected budget this year by more than half a million dollars Through these ongoing efforts over the past 5 years we have finally reached the critical mass whereby we overcame our ongoing reduced state school foundation funding (in which we still received less last year as well as this year than we received 10 vears ago), huge annual health insurance increases and inflationary cost increases to have spent less this school year than last school year! Note that the state foundation funding accounts for @ 50% of our annual operating budget – so when we receive less than we did a decade ago for half of our operating budget - in the face of huge insurance increases and other inflationary increases over that time - it inevitably creates financial hardship.

The major expenditure reductions through our belttightening, higher than projected revenue, negotiated insurance changes last year, and grant revenue have helped to "right the ship" in a major way financially!

However, do not confuse this with "saving" hundreds of thousands of dollars, because our costs continue to increase in spite of these measures. With employee salaries and health insurance, special education, growing costs of technology, as well as HVAC costs and flat-lined state funding our expenditures continue to grow. We will continue working on ways of continuing to live within our means as we move forward.

#### **Elementary Summer School Opportunities**

Teachers will be working with small groups of students allowing more individual attention for struggling readers. These small group sessions will allow students to strengthen their skills making them successful for the following school year. Teachers will be targeting struggling readers for this program and will be contacting families toward the end of the school year with more details. We are excited to be offering two summer programs to help students prepare for success in the following school year.

#### Making Summer Reading Fun!

Research has consistently shown that continuing to read throughout the summer can prevent reading loss and helps develop confident readers. Keeping children engaged in reading over the summer break can be challenging for parents, weather it is Pinterest ideas or through your local library, keeping the kids reading this summer can be a fun summer activity. Start the summer off with a reading goal and have your child track the books they read and then have a celebration in August when they have reached their goal. If you have a family vacation planned go to the library prior to the trip and find books related to your destination. The kids will love pointing out all they learned while making family vacation memories. Exploring the great outdoors is one of the best parts of summer, so make this an opportunity to read books about your child's favorite plant or animal.
