A note from our superintendent...

As we approach the holidays, let's count our blessings as well as celebrate family, friends, love, and forgiveness.

This fall has brought with it several hardships that we have been weathering, several challenging issues, a major investigation, multiple staff cancer diagnosis as well as other major health issues that have posed emotional as well as operational difficulties. In spite of this, we have been weathering these convergent storms. We are coming out on the other side all the stronger and more unified. With all of this being said, our staff and administration have continued our pursuit of excellence and our mission of "preparing our students today for tomorrow's opportunities."

A few informational items:

• We have had three groups of visitors throughout our buildings to view our students, teachers, programs, Greenhouse-Clean Energy Lab, STEM Preschool, and discuss effective rural education and learn from us. Northwestern is the "pro exemplar" and model for rural education.

• One group consisted of over 25 individuals from multiple schools, State Representative Scott Wiggam, officials from the Ohio Dept. of Education, with other officials, the media, and, of course, members of our own staff, administration, and community. We have consistently scheduled tours roughly six times per year and willingly share our knowledge and guidance with other schools and our community.

• In the past six years more than 500 individuals (educators, public officials, community members, various groups) have toured our buildings and classrooms!

• HSTW (High Schools that Work) and Northwestern again received grant funding for year two of our Solar Sprint and e-Cybermission curriculum and projects. Last year we led a 3-district consortium. This year we expanded to a 5-district consortium. Last year both our two Northwestern teams that competed nationally in Georgia finished in the top 10 nationally!

We received a \$425,000 (possibly up to \$450,000 in the end) "Expanding Opportunities Grant" that will financially support further expansion of student opportunities. Our goal with this grant is to promote our 4-year high school CTE Career Pathways, the two year middle school exploratory elective courses aligned with these pathways, expand student organizations and regional, state, and national competition opportunities, as well as increase CCP college courses available in our own high school, strengthening and expanding our current seven Career Pathways (we are currently planning on creating an eighth Career Pathway at this time, which will be announced this winter once it has been confirmed), and finally, to continue advancing our already very strong career focus, student career planning, career shadowing, exploration, internships, pre-apprenticeships, and pupil support services to further engage our students and individually support them to improve in areas of weakness, encourage their passion, nurture their God-given talents, and guide them in future career and life aspirations. In short, our goal is to INSPIRE our students!

When going "head to head" in academic competitions our students excel in ALL of our programs! Whether it be FFA, FCCLA, HOSA, Science Fair, Speech & Debate, Academic Challenge, Solar Spring, e-Cybermission, fine arts competitions our students are INCREDIBLE! In addition, having won the WCAL League two of the past three years in high school athletic competitions, our students excel in this area as well. I am proud of where we are with our outstanding teachers and programs! Northwestern continues our innovation and advocacy for quality education:

• At Northwestern we Inspire & Engage our students! Transference of STEM skills to other careers and other facets of their lives.

• Our students are problem solvers, creative, leaders, collaborative, innovative, and articulate leaders of the future.

• Through application of their learning real-world, relevant, experiences, they improvise and they perform.

• Not only was Northwestern the first K-12 STEM designated school district in Ohio, but also created what we believe is the first STEM problem based learning preschool and this year enrollment has increased enough to fund our second STEM preschool classroom! Registration for the '19-'20 STEM Preschool begins January 1st!

• In addition to Senior Seminar Capstone Career Project and our enhanced 8th grade job shadow project, last year we began a 5th grade career project.

• Collaborations: OSLN (Ohio STEM Learning Network), Battelle, High Schools that Work, the PAST Foundation for STEM Education, the 5-district Blended Learning Cohort, Northwestern led Rural LDC Collaborative Cohort, The 5-district Army AEOP Program Cohort are evidence of our leadership in helping advance education regionally.

• We must continue to think systemically, not in isolation of individual programs or just ourselves. We must change the very culture of our schools through Problem Based Learning instruction and learning.

Northwestern is blessed with numerous quality programs as developed and taught by outstanding teachers. However, beyond this we have embraced STEM education and applied PBL learning district-wide in all areas. This has made all the difference.

Finally, thank you (as always) for the strong community support! Our schools are synonymous with our community. Our schools and community are one in the same. Our leadership has guided our district well, as we have increased our programs and career pathways. We have been very purposeful in our direction and ensuring the sustainability of these programs, which we have shared with numerous other districts locally, regionally, state-wide, and nationally. This is why Northwestern is the rural model for the very best instruction of excellent programs in our elementary, middle school, and high school buildings that operate in the most efficient and sustainable manner possible. District Finances – Inconsistency is the New Normal in State Funding

Over my 29 years in education and 24 years as a school administrator I have never observed the lack of predictability in regard to school revenue as being so difficult. By reading below you can get a glimpse of some of these numerous variants. In addition, we are often blind-sided by mid-year requirements and financial changes in rules by the Ohio Dept. of Education that are unanticipated.

As has been the norm over the past 8 years, the only consistency in public school finances has been our local tax dollar revenue. We have observed the state of Ohio has been increasingly creative in the way they quietly reduce funding to public schools over the past 8 years – most especially rural school districts. We continue due diligence in spending and do so under watchful eyes.

• State funding has waned and been, in essence, flat-lined over the past 8 years (yet inflation and personnel costs continue to escalate).

• Ohio has reduced transportation funding for rural schools through their funding mechanism – yes, the rural schools, which drive the most miles per student.

• Ohio has decreased their funds for support-related costs (such as ESC supports, Preschool funds, etc.) which has resulted in school district having to pay these costs (thus an end-all reduction in funding).

• CCP (College Credit Plus) cost burden shift onto the backs of local school districts. This has essentially now become a cash cow for participating colleges. We are proud of the successes of our students participating in CCP and support the financial savings this can provide for parents. We have more students than ever participating in full-time CCP courses at colleges, which costs the district huge financial dollars. However, often we have students taking courses on college campuses that we offer for college credit here in our building at substantially lower costs to the district.

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The state does not allow us to direct enrollment to our classes in these cases. Also, the state requires the schools to pay for high textbook costs as well as the tuition, which should not be the case. We have countered by increasing the number of CCP courses we offer here on our campus in which our teachers provide much greater support than do the area colleges.

• The Ohio Department of Education has continued promoting private entities to take local dollars with little restriction through special "scholarships" where the entities are not even required to educate the students – costing our district \$10,000 - \$30,000 annually per student. The numbers have increased as a result of the Department's lack of oversight of these organizations, thus allowing them to bleed school districts.

• Over the past several years the lower home valuations has hurt our tax collections while about the same time increased CAUV agricultural value calculations has slightly helped our tax collections. The district is likely to lose substantial tax dollars with a state change in formula regarding CAUV agricultural value calculations, which is forthcoming. We are unsure as yet as to the amount of the specific funding reductions that will affect us.

• Ever-increasing Charter-Community Schools deductions costs us hundreds of thousands of dollars annually – that the state deducts – whether we agree with services or not (often partial attendance to low-performing online schools, as an example).

• Increasing Special Education services and personnel costs due to state, federal mandates and MRDD freezing Ida Sue services for new students. This has resulted in our needing to employ several additional intervention specialist teachers and aides over the past few years.

• Employee costs (most notably health care cost increases, in which premiums increased 11.4% this past summer) always go up. We are working on ways to control health care costs as best we can. Thanks to the understanding of our employees and the common sense fiscal management of the district administration and board of education, the district has been averaging 1% annual raises the past decade – even the past few years, while we have all seen other area schools

and cities the past few years increasing salaries between 2%-3%. However, even a 1% increase annually adds significant costs to the district.

What has helped Northwestern sustain adequate funding:

• Consistently strong incoming open enrollment students and the related revenue. We had a record incoming open enrollment of 253 students at the start of this school year. We balance this with caps on class sizes so we continue with balanced, small class sizes, while accepting these students and improving our cost efficiency.

• Grant Funding – We received @ \$1,000,000 of grant funding in 2016, over \$200,000 in 2017, and already more than \$550,000 this school year. However, the grant funding is inconsistent and not a reliable source of revenue. Also, most grant dollars are aligned to specific program goals and improvements, so normally do not equate to much in the area of cost savings for the district (grants and community donations did build our Greenhouse-Clean Energy lab, however!)

• We have strategically and painstakingly planned our STEM and Career Pathway Programs as well as provided necessary faculty training in order to obtain substantial additional federal Career & Technical Education weighted funding to ensure adequate funds for the sustainability of these programs

In the end, due to these numerous factors all calculated and coming into play above and high costs of HVAC upgrades and roof work over the past few years, we were in the red as far as expenditures exceeding revenue the past two school years. We are anticipating additional flooring replacement needs over the next few years as well. There are also many additional factors that play into our state and federal revenue, such as the possibility of major federal funding reductions for Title I (low wealth) and IDEA (special education) funding for public schools. The latest 5-year forecast predicts funding carryover 5-year forecast has predicted the carryover balance to run-out in 3 years. We continue to walk the tightrope with district finances while also balancing the best personnel, best programs, and continued educational excellence and opportunities for each of our students!

EMERGENCY DELAY OR CANCELLATION DAYS

With the severely cold weather and winter remaining we would like to remind parents about our delay and cancellation procedures. When our school buses travel over 1,436 miles each day in our 94 square mile school district, picking up students it is imperative that the roads are safe to travel. The safety of children and drivers is the only issue when considering whether to cancel school.

If conditions are questionable regarding student and bus safety, both the Northwestern Transportation Mechanic Jon Wellert and Northwestern Superintendent Jeff Layton drive the roads prior to 5:00 a.m. - communicating with each other – in order to make the final decision before 5:30 a.m. At 5:30 many of our dedicated bus drivers have already begun their routes on poor weather days. The Superintendent also listens to weather forecasts and confers with other area school districts - all of who also do assessments of road conditions. A decision is made to delay or cancel school if it is unsafe for students and/or unsafe for bus travel. Since Northwestern stretches so far north-south we may not always make the same decision as other school districts. This is because we are concerned with Northwestern students first and foremost.

When the Wayne County Sheriff issues a Level 2 weather warning, telling motorists to drive only if it is an emergency, school is automatically cancelled.

However, sometimes these announcements do not come before announcement of school closing has to occur.

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Ohio Alerts Text and e-mail Alerts

The district, school buildings, and various school subgroups send mass communication to anyone registered for these. Usage is particularly important use for communicating school delays and closures, or emergency situations. We do not register individuals for the text or

e-mail alerts, nor do we manage the site. Please visit the Northwestern website for a link

to register or manage your account. For those who wish to be removed from the system entirely simply reply "STOP" or "UNSUB-SCRIBE".

In addition, often the road conditions change quickly and dramatically – sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse - between the time of the final decision at 5:30 a.m. and the time MS and HS may begin with a 2-hour delay (9:15 a.m.) or elem. may begin with a 2-hour delay (11:00 a.m.).

Information on school closing is available and most accurate by registering for communications through OhioAlerts.com (a link is also on our Northwestern website). Parents, students, and community members can register for text alerts and/or e-mail alerts. One important note: Ohio Alerts is no longer providing this product as of January 1. Therefore we have been working to find a replacement text alert product. The replacement product will be determined by Dec. 1. The registration process and address will be posted on our website as well as communicated through the OhioAlerts System. Watch for it!

Also, calling the district or individual school building phone numbers and listening to the recorded message on our automated phone system is an option. Announcements are also made through local radio stations WQKT and WNCO as well as TV stations WEWS (Channel 5), WKYC (Channel 3), and FOX WJW (Channel 8). The school district phone recordings and radio stations are the quickest to post the information. Television stations have between a 15-minute and 30-minute lag time before the information is posted an occasionally do post inaccurate messages. Also, a decision to close is announced by 8:00 a.m. at the very latest. Otherwise, we will remain open.

Northwestern Schools "Home of the Huskies"


Message from Mr. Brightbill

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


New Partner for Northwestern FFA

New to the district this year, is the conjoining of the Partners for Fish & Wildlife program and the Northwestern High School Agricultural Department. A major component of setting up the connection, is a 2015 Northwestern Graduate and FFA Alumni, Ryan Morr. Morr is a senior at Paul Smith's College, majoring in ecological restoration. After his internship with the Ohio Private Lands Office through the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Morr plans to continue working with the federal service after graduation.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service was created to assist landowners in restoring and improving habitats for various forms of wildlife. Through financial and technical assistance, the program is able to aid in restoring any property that is not owned by a state or federal body. Some of the recent projects completed include: native prairie and pollinator habitat restoration. riparian corridor, timber stand and early succession habitat improvement. Recently, the group partnered with greenhouses across the state, including the Ohio State University and Ashtabula Technical Career Campus, to grow seeds to be collected through the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative (OPHI). These plants are then used in restoration sites to improve or restore pollinator habitat. OHPI consists of more than 80 partners who have come together, in efforts to protect and restore pollinator habitat across Ohio. Milkweed seeds, along with other nectar plant seeds, have been collected by the pound at the hand of volunteers in efforts to establish more effective Monarch Butterfly habitats, as their sum weakens. The program would like to partner with the Agricultural Education Department to grow milkweed plants in our greenhouse. These plants can be later distributed across the state in order to improve habitats, as well as transplanted in the learning lab behind the Northwestern Elementary School. Additionally, through educational

involvement, it is our hope to establish classroom based learning, as well as opportunities for students to see what the program is and how to stay involved. We are looking forward to all that the students will learn though this rewarding program.


