A note from our superintendent...

Blessings to everyone throughout our community as we move toward our holiday season!

This has been a challenging start to the school year due to COVID safety and educational preparations. Our faculty, staff, and administrators have done a fantastic job with these challenges thus far. As we continue through this this school full of surprises we know that education is so much more than state test results and even career development. It is also supporting our social-emotional and mental needs of students, families & employees; also continuing our rigorous hands-on instruction and programs, excellent fine arts and cultural opportunities as best we can in this environment. In addition, we must maintain excellent extracurricular opportunities, promote a high attendance rate, high graduation rate, and seek scholarship dollars, skills, and opportunities for our graduates, experiential learning opportunities for all, and prepare students for their long-term success in career, college, and society. Engaging students, providing rigor, developing relationships and creating opportunities for every student to develop toward attainment of their potential in a safe and secure setting are all important. Also needed components of developing wellrounded, educated graduates, give our students "the edge for jobs and scholarships, develop problem-solvers and leaders of tomorrow, and all around good people.

We must continue moving forward while living within our financial means. This has been a challenge the past several years with the perfect storm of huge increases in health insurance and other areas, reduced state funding, HVAC and other needs. We are beginning a Health Insurance Committee in January to discuss more efficient choices and practices.

We have had a district finance committee in place for well over a year, which is doing more with financial planning of the district. Finances are a simple concept – balance revenue and expenditures. However, with the convoluted and unpredictable funding streams from the state and federal government and increased costs this is very challenging. With 83% of our costs being personnel and the non-personnel items being overwhelmingly necessary this has proven very, very difficult. Know that we are continuously working to increase revenues and reduce expenditures.

On the revenue side, we continue grant writing efforts, shared services agreements with other entities, pursue weighted funding from the state, and fight for every dollar we can get from state and federal government for our children. Please note some of the grants and contributions we have successfully sought-out and received this school year. Every dollar helps.

On the expenditure side we negotiate costs with vendors, spend only when necessary, complete many more maintenance projects in-house with our own employees, reduced staff last summer, have been working on a 2021-2022 SY staff-reduction plan (which will be finalized in early spring), and are analyzing every expenditure.

As a district we move forward systemically and study the impact of changes on students, staff, and the organization as a whole. Due to the current budget crisis, reduction in staff, and changing needs of our society, district, and students The district has taken the opportunity to improve efficiencies and re-invent many positions to be more effective through our collaborative approach to meet the needs of our students in their development of 21st Century Skills, Career Development, Academics, and Social Skills in order to "prepare our student today for tomorrow's opportunities!"

I take great pride in sharing the continued accomplishments of our students, community, and schools. The supports and relationships throughout our community are unique. We can take great pride in our schools and together we can continue to strive for even greater heights. With our dedicated administrators, staff, and supportive community we will continue striving for and achieving well-beyond expectations. As we all know, "our children are our future." Five Year Forecast 101

One instrument that is crucial to assess the financial condition of a district is the Five Year Forecast; a public school treasurer submits an updated version at least twice a year to Ohio Department of Education (ODE). The report displays the revenue and expenses for the general fund (approximately 80% of the district's total funding). The forecast reflects:

- 3 actual years for historical,
- · the current year, and
- 4 years of future projections.

The majority of the tax dollars collected from tax payers are accounted for in these figures; however, this does not reflect all financial activity of the school district as a whole.

The forecast is somewhat like envisioning the future; typically based on historically data and consideration of some of the 'knowns' of the near future for the district, a living document that becomes outdated with every change to any of its data. Any change to the elements also changes the future assumptions. The figures of the forecast tell only a portion of the financial forecast. There is a narrative that accompanies the forecast and articulates the assumptions considered for each element. Each intricacy and detail is substantial to the projected accuracy of the forecast.

Northwestern's general budget is over \$15 million for FY21. Generating revenue, local and income taxes represent approximately \$5 million and \$2 million (annually) respectively; additionally, \$7 million is collected via 'foundation' (state funding), and the balance is gathered by school fees, workbooks, planners, tech fees, etc. Some items that aid the balance by way of taxes would be new or increased levies, new construction, more corporate business taxes, and the like.

The primary expense categories are wages, benefits, professional development/tuition, supplies, equipment, and other. Wages and benefits is the majority of the expense arena making up nearly 83% of the expenses, 53% and 30% respectively. The other categories of expenses make up the other 17% of the budget.

Unfortunately, the cash balance trend for Northwestern has not been solid for over a decade and has been actively depleting since 2015.

Then COVID struck! Even with the COVID relief funding from the state, all of the barriers and sanitation items that were necessary to open the buildings and maintaining of the precautions will likely be totaling more than the revenue in the end. Dr. Layton is continually searching and applying for more grants and COVID aid.

Through all the chaos and uncertainties, we have been thrown into, I have observed many acts of kindness and compassion the Northwestern staff has displayed in these trying times in putting the students first in all aspects.

Charters and vouchers took away over one-half billion in local revenue from school districts in school year 2019-2020.

\$525,187,286* in local revenue was deducted from school districts for privately-operated alternatives to the public common system. Columbus property taxpayers subsidized charter and voucher students to the tune of \$76, 548,933* during the 2019-2020 school year.

Article VI §2 of the Ohio Constitution requires the state to secure a thorough and efficient system of common schools. The Ohio Supreme Court ruled four times that the system is unconstitutional. Yet the state removes hundreds of millions of dollars from school districts to fund the state's pet projects. Incredible!

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EMERGENCY DELAY OR CANCELLATION DAYS

With the severely cold weather and winter remaining we would like to remind parents about our delay and cancellation procedures. When our school buses travel over 1,436 miles each day in our 94 square mile school district, picking up students it is imperative that the roads are safe to travel. The safety of students and drivers is the primary issue when considering whether to cancel school.

If conditions are questionable regarding student and bus safety, both the Northwestern Transportation Mechanic Jonathon Wellert and Northwestern Superintendent Jeff Layton drive the roads prior to 5:00 a.m. – often communicating with each other, ODOT, Townships, County Engineers – in order to make the final decision before 5:30 a.m. At 5:30 many of our dedicated bus drivers have already begun their routes on poor weather days. The Superintendent also listens to weather forecasts and confers with other area school district superintendents – all of who also do assessments of their road conditions. A decision is made to delay or cancel school if it is unsafe for students and/or unsafe for bus travel. Since Northwestern stretches so far north-south we may not always make the same decision as other school districts. This is because we are concerned with Northwestern students first and foremost. However, we also have an obligation to also fulfill our mission of providing an excellent education for our students.

Know that our buses do have heaters and they also drop-down chains. We installed the chains for a reason – so we can fulfill transporting our children to and from school safely. Trust our dedicated and experienced bus drivers to do this with the safest equipment.

When the Wayne County Sheriff issues a Level 2 weather warning, telling motorists to drive only if it is an emergency, school is automatically cancelled. However, sometimes these announcements do not come before announcement of school closing has to occur. In addition, often the road conditions change quickly and dramatically – sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse - between the time of the final decision at 5:30 a.m. and the time MS and HS may begin with a 2-hour delay. As most people are aware the superintendent has made the extra effort to make the decision between 5:00-5:30 and closer to 5:00am if at all possible depending on the conditions and situation.

Information on school closing is available and most accurate by registering for communications. Parents, students, and community members can register for text alerts and/or e-mail alerts through our website.

The school text and e-mail alerts systems are the most efficient and immediate as far as information, please register if you have not. Additionally, district phone recordings, website, twitter,

instagram, facebook, as well as radio station WQKT are the quickest to post the information. Also, calling the district or individual school building phone numbers and listening to the recorded message on our automated phone system is an option. Announcements are also made through local radio stations WQKT and WNCO as well as TV stations WEWS (Channel 5), WKYC (Channel 3), and FOX WJW (Channel 8). Television stations have between a 15-minute and 30-minute lag time before the information is posted an occasionally do post inaccurate messages or their systems become overwhelmed. Also, following a delay a decision to close is announced by 7:30 a.m. at the very latest. Otherwise, assume that we will remain open.



Tech Corner

For over two years we have been looking to the future and planning the upgrade of our network to better support the usage requirements of our staff and students with online resources, curriculum and testing.

Over the past eighteen months, Northwestern has been upgrading the school's network infrastructure due to needed repair, replacement of old and outdated network hardware and to increase the bandwidth capacity of our network. The first round of updates was performed during the summer of 2019 within the high school with the installation of internal fiber and the purchase of new network switches using E-Rate grant funding. At the end of 2019, additional grant funding was used to fully cover the installation of new fiber between the high school and the elementary school. This section of fiber was failing with only 30% of the installed fiber strands operational. The replacement of this section then allowed for the installation of the new switching equipment at the high school with an increase in network bandwidth from 1GB to 10GB.

In the summer of 2020, E-Rate grant funding was again utilized for all network upgrades beginning with the fiber installation between the high school and the middle school and between network closets within both the middle and elementary schools. New network switches, also purchased with E-Rate funding has given us the ability to upgrade our entire internal network from 1GB to 10GB. Within the next few months our connection to our Internet provider, TCCSA (Tri-County Computer Services Association) located in Wooster, which already had the capability of running at 10GB will be upgraded.

These upgrades would not have been possible without E-rate grants we have received. To receive E-Rate funding, the process begins with the request for services and or equipment that falls within the guidelines of covered services and equipment. Once accepted, there is a competitive bidding process followed by the submission of the accepted bid proposals. This is then followed by approval process. If approved, the purchase of services or equipment may proceed. Funding is based on the number of free/reduced lunch recipients within a school district's total enrollment. Our funding rate over the last several years has been 70 percent. The total cost for all upgrades for the past 2 years was \$72,816, however, after E-Rate grants and additional grant funding the cost to the district totaled \$17,926.

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Information for Parents and Students on Laws and Rules of the Bus

- Please make sure the school has a working phone number for contact We have to be able to contact you.
- 2. Place of Safety Arrive 5 minutes prior to pick up time. It is OHIO Law.
 - A) Driver will designate a **place of safety** location for the student(s) 10 feet from the road. Driver will try to give a landmark to know where to stand.
 - B) If the student is in a vehicle, in the driveway, they need to get out of the vehicle as they see the bus approaching and be at the designated place of safety when the bus stops.

3. Loading and Unloading Students From the Bus (OHIO LAW)

- A) Student(s) must be at the place of safety assigned by the bus driver or walk 10 steps or more along the side of the roadway to the front of the bus if they are crossing over. Student(s) must wait for driver's hand signal (driver will drop their hand straight down)
- B) When the driver drops their hand, the student(s) must walk to the center of the road (traffic edge), stop there, and recheck traffic before crossing.
- C) If it is safe, the student(s) must go directly to their place of safety. The student(s) must remain there until the bus has passed the place of safety.
- D) If the driver blows the horn, that means danger. The student(s) should recheck traffic. If the student(s) sees nothing, they should look back at the driver for fur ther instructions.

4. Proper Bus Rules and Etiquette While Riding

- Students will be asked to jump seat in the afternoon. When the student's stop is
 next on the route, the student will come up to seat 2 and sit. This helps the driver
 know who is/is not on to alleviate the driver from missing a stop, especially if
 there is a sub driver.
- Students must sit back-to-back, seat-to-seat, and feet to floor if they can touch.
 Book bags must be kept in the student's lap.
- Students must stay in their seat and out of the aisle at all times for safety pur
 poses. The seat in front of the student acts as a safety guard, and students need to
 be behind it at all times.
- NO standing when the bus is moving.
- NO talking when the lights are on inside the bus.
- NO food or drinks on the bus. Students need to keep these items in their book bag.
- NO live animals on the bus.
- Everything a student brings on the bus must be held in their lap.
- NO toys, stuffed animals, trading cards, etc. on the bus. Students must keep these
 items in their book bag.
- Electronic devices (with ear devices) are allowed on the bus. The district/driver is not responsible for items being lost, stolen, or broken. These items are for individual student use only.



- Aisle ways must be clear at all times, with no body parts in the aisle. Students may not turn around, hand things across the aisle, etc.
- NO taking pictures on the bus.
- NO loud talking, screaming, or yelling on the bus. Students should use indoor voices on the bus.
- Students may read or look at books, do homework, or use their electronic devices while on the bus.
- An adult **MUST** be at the place of safety to get a Kindergartener off the bus. This is Board Policy.

Student Services Announcement

The University of Akron (UA) is taking another step to help students and their families afford college. UA is giving an automatic \$500 scholarship to every student who applies for admission and completes the FAFSA by Dec. 1, 2020. Students who apply to UA will also be automatically considered for the Akron Guarantee Scholarship, which ranges from \$8,000 to \$34,000 over four years. 

- * Graduation Requirements- State law introduced new, permanent graduation requirements that are available for the classes of 2021 and beyond. Information regarding graduation requirements for the classes of 2021 & beyond can be found on Northwestern HS Student Services webpage.
- * Ohio State Diploma Seals: Ohio law created 12 seals for students to demonstrate academics, technical and professional readiness for careers, college, the military or self-sustaining professions. Each seal allows students to demonstrate knowledge and skills essential for future success. Students will demonstrate readiness by earning at least two diploma seals, one of which must be state defined.
- * OhioMeans Jobs Readiness Seal (State)- Meet the requirements and criteria established for the readiness seal, including demonstration of work-readiness and professional competencies.
- * Industry-Recognized Credential Seal (State)- Earn an approved industry-recognized credential that is aligned to a job considered in demand in Ohio and its regions.
- * College-Ready Seal (State)- Earn remediation-free scores on the ACT or SAT.
- * Military Enlistment Seal (State)-Provide evidence of enlistment in a branch of the U.S. Armed Forces; or participate in an approved JROTC program.
- * Citizenship Seal (State)- A student can: 1. Earn a score of proficient or higher on both the American History and American Government end-of-course exams; 2. Earn a final course grade that is equivalent to "B" or higher in appropriate classes taken through the College Credit Plus program.

- * Student Engagement Seal (Local)-Participate in extracurricular activities such as athletics, clubs or student government to a meaningful extent, as determined by guidelines adopted by student's local board of education
- * College Credit Plus (CCP): A reminder that Northwestern High School offers students the opportunity to engage in more than 27 college courses; earning college transcript credit. College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual enrollment program that provides students in grades 7-12 the opportunity to earn college and high school credits at the same time by taking courses from Ohio colleges or universities. The purpose of this program is to enhance students' career readiness and postsecondary success,

while providing a wide variety of options to college-ready students, at no or limited costs to students and families.

* Guidance/Clinical Counseling: Northwestern Local Schools offer many support services for our students. 

The students build Electric / Solar Power cars to race for the overall title of the fastest car. PBIS

Here at Northwestern Elementary we prepare students for their academic future, however we also want to create a more effective and safer school by supporting positive student behaviors. Our building participates in an initiative called Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS). PBIS is a research-based, schoolwide, and classroom behavior supports system approach to creating safer and more productive learning environments where teachers can teach and all students can learn. The PBIS system is broken into three tiers to help support students. Tier 1 supports are universal incentives provided to all students at the elementary building. Over the past several years Northwestern Elementary has provided numerous Tier 1 supports to our students such as Brag Tags, Hero/Student of the Month, spirit weeks, kindness challenges, canned food drives, and mindfulness lessons. Tier 2 supports are targeted preventions for some students who may need support improving specific skills. Programs like Husky Buddies, lunch/social groups, Safety Patrol, Blessings in Backpack, and sensory boxes provided supports to numerous students throughout Northwestern Elementary. The final level of supports is more intensive and individualized for few students who require a more intensive approach. Northwestern Elementary is extremely fortunate to be able to provide services such as counseling and case management through our local mental health agencies. Along with Mr. Brightbill and Mrs. McQuate each grade level team is represented on the PBIS Team which meets monthly to develop and review building supports. Throughout the 2020-2021 school year five members of the PBIS team are attending trainings to further our PBIS supports which will strengthen this initiative. We are looking forward to building upon our program helping all students be successful this school year.

The PBIS system also focuses on ways to support students' social emotional learning helping them become more successful academically. At the elementary we are always looking for ways to help students develop good habits which will help them in any future situation they find themselves in. This school year we will be using a building wide curriculum called The Mind Up to teach students strategies for learning and being successful in school. Each lesson provides students with knowledge about the how the brain works, career connections to how the strategies they are learning may help them in a future job and links to other curriculum areas such as literature and math. Strategies will help students build resiliency to stress, help focus their attention and develop a positive mind-set in both school and life. This new curriculum and our PBIS program will continue to help students of Northwestern Elementary reach their academic and personally goals. We believe that the way we help our students succeed is by working as a team and we realize that Northwestern families are an essential member of our team. With the support of Northwestern PTO, we have been able to provide family friendly events such as STEM Night, Polar Express Movie Night, Fun Fair and Reading Under the Lights. We are hoping to provide more activities in the future and are looking forward to seeing our wonderful families having fun together. In the meantime, if your family is in need of support of any kind please contact the school so that we can find the resources to help you and your family.







GRATITUDE AND KINDNESS CAN CHANGE THE WORLD ACTIVITIES FOR ADULTS

Write a Letter or Email of Gratitude:

Think about something or someone you can thank for something they have done for you. Write it down. Send gratitude to that person today.

Happy Day:

Start your day with an affirmation of having a happy day. Find three things that went well or made you laugh today. Notice how many times you laughed. Laughter is important!

Gratitude Journal:

List three things that you are grateful in your journal every day. It can be family time, the sun, or a good night's sleep. It can be little things or big things. Expressing gratitude boosts your mood and makes you feel better about your day.

Difficult Times:

During difficult times and when you're feeling blue, re-read your entries from your gratitude journal. This is an amazing practice – it builds resilience, optimism, and changes your overall state of mind.

OUR LANGUAGE CREATES OUR WORLD

Words matter. The language we use helps to reinforce our understanding and our thinking. The more we practice mindful language, the more it becomes part of who we are, what we do, and how our children respond to what we are saying.

Start using the word 'mindful'.

"How many ways can we be mindful in showing our kindness today?"

"They look a bit sad. I want to be more mindful of what I can do to cheer them up."

"I am grateful that we can spend time together."

MINDFUL MOMENTS OF REFLECTION

Gratitude at Bedtime: It is fun to share what you are grateful for. Take some time before bed to think and share three things you are grateful for.

Journal Jotting: We love to remember fun things that happen to us. Share your stories together. Play a game called "Remember When." Include sensory memories in your writing:

- What did you see?
- What did you smell?
- What did you hear?
- What did you taste?

ACTIVITIES WITH YOUR CHILD

Be a Mindful Role Model:

Show kindness and gratitude. Choose an act of kindness around the home. Help a family member with a daily activity. A mindful parent will create a mindful child.

Kindness Brainstorm:

Think of all the ways you and your child can be kind. Write them down and each day, choose one act of kindness.

Kindness to the Planet:

Share with your child what you can do as a family to be mindful and kind to our planet. For example, we can be mindful of our use of plastic

Smile and Say Thank You:

Help your child understand the value of smiling and saying thank you. It is respectful and kind – and the bonus is it makes you and the other person feel good!

Difficult Times:

When a child is feeling anxious, sad, or uncertain and is showing levels of anxiety, have them look into their gratitude journal and remember what makes them happy. This can change their brain and build a more positive mindset.

Gratitude Discussion:

Gather as a family once a week at the dinner table or in a circle on the floor. Share what you are grateful for in each other and as a family. Pick an object, like a gratitude stone, and take turns sharing what you are grateful for.

Activating Gratitude:

Encourage your child to show acts of gratitude. Have them write a letter of appreciation to a caregiver, doctor, parent, teacher, sibling, or a friend.



Students must document a minimum of 500 hours of work experience on their project, achieved scores in three of the following WebXam categories; Agriculture Food, and Natural Resources, Animal and Plant Science, Plant and Horticulture Science, Animal Science and Technology, Agronomic Systems, Mechanical Principles, Structural Engineering, Livestock Nutrition, Selection, and Management, Livestock Science, Science and Technology of Food, Environmental Science for Agriculture and Natural Resources, or Greenhouse and Nursery Management. Students apply in May, and they are then selected based on their qualifications and applications that have been submitted.


