As we approach the holidays, let's count our blessings as well as celebrate family, friends, love, and forgiveness.

There will be a team of Northwestern Administrators/Teachers/Board Members sharing our STEM programs at the Ohio School Boards Capital Conference in Columbus this November. This is a national venue that draws board members and administrators from all across the nation and will further promote quality STEM education across the state and beyond the state boundaries.

I recently returned from the National PLTW (Project Lead the Way) STEM Conference and am proud of where we are with our outstanding teachers and programs! Northwestern continues our innovation and advocacy for quality STEM education:

- At Northwestern we Inspire & Engage our students! Transference of STEM skills to other careers and other facets of their lives.

Two Incumbent Board of Education members running to retain their seats

Northwestern has two Board Members running – each desires to continue to serve and retain their current seats.

Incumbent Board member Paula Abrecht will be a write-in candidate to retain her seat as Board of Education Member. An error on the application resulted in her write-in status rather than being named on the ballot.

Incumbent Board member Laura Woodring is named on the ballot as a candidate to retain her seat as Board of Education Member. Both of these two Board of Education Members have served our students and community well during prior and current service!

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Dismal Results for Vouchers

Our question for us is "why do our Ohio legislators continue robbing dollars from Quality Public Schools such as ours with most of these funds going to low-performing charter schools?" Often these are online charter schools which have not taken attendance and where students have not completed classwork.

The evidence is in, and it does not support the case for vouchers. Is it possible that legislators value the huge campaign contributions over the good use of public tax dollars?

The continued push for school vouchers, which transfer scarce taxpayer dollars out of public education and into private schools, is "a triumph of ideology over evidence," according to a recent story in Long Island's Newsday.

The story points to a Brookings Institution report on four rigorous studies: "On average, students that use vouchers to attend private schools do less well on tests than similar students that do not attend private schools." Information such as this is difficult to dig up. Although vouchers and charter school advocates ground their arguments on demands for test-based accountability, the Newsday account reports that 70% of the largest voucher programs either don't require students to take standardized tests or don't make the results publicly available.

District Finances – Inconsistency is the New Normal Due to State Funding

Over my 28 years in education and 23 years as a school administrator I have never observed the lack of predictability in regard to school revenue. By reading below you can get a glimpse of these numerous variants. In addition, we are often blind-sided by mid-year requirements and financial changes in rules by the Ohio Dept. of Education that are unanticipated.

As has been the norm over the past 7 years, the only consistency in public school finances has been our local tax dollar revenue. We have observed the state of Ohio has been increasingly creative in the way they secretly reduce funding to public education over the past 7 years. We continue due diligence in spending and do so under watchful eyes.

- State funding has waned and been, in essence, flat-lined over the past 7 years (yet costs continue to escalate).
- Ohio has reduced transportation funding for rural schools.
- Ohio has decreased their funds for support-related costs (such as ESC supports, Preschool funds, etc.) which has resulted in school district having to pay these costs (thus an end-all reduction in funding).
- CCP (College Credit Plus) cost burden shift onto the backs of local school districts. This has essentially now become a cash cow for participating colleges. We are proud of the successes of our students participating in CCP and support the financial savings this can provide for parents, we have more students than ever participating in full-time CCP courses at colleges, which costs the district huge financial dollars. However, often we have students taking courses on college campuses that we offer for college credit here in our building at substantially lower costs to the district. The state does not allow us to direct enrollment to our classes in these cases. Also, the state requires the schools to pay for high textbook costs as well as the tuition, which should not be the case.
- Over the past several years the lower home valuations has hurt our tax collections while about
 the same time increased CAUV agricultural value calculations has slightly helped our tax collections.
 These have essentially been in balance.

- The district is likely to lose substantial tax dollars with a state change in formula regarding CAUV agricultural value calculations, which is on the horizon. We are unsure as yet as to the amount of the specific funding reductions that will affect us.
- Ever-increasing Charter-Community Schools deductions costs us hundreds of thousands of dollars annually – that the state deducts – whether we agree with services or not (often partial attendance to online schools, as an example)
- Increasing Special Education services and personnel costs due to state, federal mandates and MRDD freezing Ida Sue services for new students. This has resulted in our needing to employ several additional intervention specialist teachers and aides.
- Employee costs (most notably health care cost increases) always go up. Thanks to the understanding of our employees and the common sense fiscal management of the district administration and Board of Education, the district has bene averaging 1% annual raises the past decade even the past few years, while we have all seen other area schools and cities increasing salaries between 2%-3%. However, even a 1% increase annually adds significant costs to the district.

What has helped Northwestern sustain adequate funding:

- Consistently strong incoming open enrollment students and the related revenue.
- The passed emergency levy that took effect last July (this was the levy amount that was passed to essentially replace the former HS Bond Levy from the 1990s). This amount was a reduction from the amount of the original HS Bond Levy, but has been sorely needed!
- Grant Funding We received @ \$1,000,000 of grant funding in 2016, for example, and over \$100,000 already this school year.
- We have strategically and painstakingly planned our STEM and Career Pathway Programs as well as provided necessary faculty training in order to obtain substantial additional federal Career & Technical Education weighted funding to ensure adequate funds for the sustainability of these programs.

In the end, due to these numerous factors all calculated and coming into play above and high costs

of HVAC upgrades over the past few years we were in the red as far as expenditures exceeding revenue this past 16-17SY.

There are also many additional factors that play into our state and federal revenue, such as the possibility of major federal funding reductions for Title I (low wealth) and IDEA (special education) funding for public schools. The latest 5-year forecast predicts funding carryover balance to run-out in 2.5 years. Historically, the 5-year forecast has predicted the carryover balance to run-out in 3 years. We continue to walk the tightrope with district finances while also balancing the best personnel, best programs, and continued educational excellence and opportunities for each of our students!

Reliance on property tax the same as in year of first DeRolph decision.

In an October 2, 2017 10th Period post, Steve Dyer points out 55.62 percent of school revenue now comes from property tax, the same percentage as the year of the first Ohio Supreme Court decision in DeRolph. If the \$935 million transferred to charters is removed, the local percentage increases to 57 percent.

The Court, in DeRolph, identified four factors that contribute to the unworkability of the system and must be eliminated. The two most compelling factors were the operation of the school foundation program and the emphasis on property tax in the funding formula. Obviously the formula cannot be "fixed" until the emphasis on property tax is greatly reduced.

The solution to both equity and adequacy is to increase the percentage of the revenue provided by the state to, in the range of 70%.

To compound the problem for local property taxpayers, the state has reduced the local government fund significantly. The rainy day fund has been bankrolled by reductions to schools and other local governments.

SB 39 would hold e-schools not sponsored by a school district accountable for recording, calculating and reporting attendance

SB 39 had a second hearing before the Senate Education Committee on September 27. Belpre Superintendent Tony Dunn, BASA's Tom Ash, OSBA's Jay Smith, BATS's Brittney Alexander, PEP's Jeanne Melvin and OEA's Matt Dodson testified in favor of the bill.

SB 39 is a comprehensive bill that would likely put e-schools like ECOT and K-12 Inc.'s Ohio Virtual Academy out of business because they would be paid only for students that are participating. For a decade and a half, some charter e-schools have been collecting per pupil funding on the basis of enrollment rather than participation. In other words, a very high percentage of their students are in violation of the compulsory attendance law.

Unfortunately, this bill will likely not pass because state officials in charge of state government will hold it hostage. Campaign contributions will determine the fate of this bill. Notwithstanding the dim prediction of passage, it is incumbent on the public education community to lobby for it.

Hopefully SB 39 will have more hearings. Regardless, public school advocates should contact their legislators to express support.

EMERGENCY DELAY OR CANCELLATION DAYS

With the severely cold weather and winter remaining we would like to remind parents about our delay and cancellation procedures. When our school buses travel over 1,436 miles each day in our 94 square mile school district, picking up students it is imperative that the roads are safe to travel. The safety of children and drivers is the only issue when considering whether to cancel school.

If conditions are questionable regarding student and bus safety, both the Northwestern Transportation Mechanic Armand Massary and Northwestern Superintendent Jeff Layton drive the roads prior to 5:00 a.m. - communicating with each other – in order to make the final decision before 5:30 a.m. At 5:30 many of our dedicated bus drivers have already begun their routes on poor weather days. The Superintendent also listens to weather forecasts and confers with other area school districts - all of who also do assessments of road conditions. A decision is made to delay or cancel school if it is unsafe for students and/or unsafe for bus travel. Since Northwestern stretches so far north-south we may not always make the same decision as other school districts. This is because we are concerned with Northwestern students first and foremost.

When the Wayne County Sheriff issues a Level 2 weather warning, telling motorists to drive only if it is an emergency, school is automatically cancelled. However, sometimes these announcements do not come before announcement of school closing has to occur. In addition, often the road conditions change quickly and dramatically – sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse - between the time of the final decision at 5:30 a.m. and the time MS and HS may begin with a 2-hour delay (9:15 a.m.) or Elem. may begin with a 2-hour delay (11:00 a.m.).

Information on school closing is available and most accurate by registering for communications through OhioAlerts.com (a link is also on our Northwestern website). Parents, students, and community members can register for text alerts and/or e-mail alerts. One important note: Ohio Alerts is no longer providing this product as of January 1. Therefore we have been working to find a replacement text alert product. The replacement product will be determined by Dec. 1. The registration process and address will be posted on our website as well as communicated through the OhioAlerts System. Watch for it!

Also, calling the district or individual school building phone numbers and listening to the recorded message on our automated phone system is an option. Announcements are also made through local radio stations WQKT and WNCO as well as TV stations WEWS (Channel 5), WKYC (Channel 3), and FOX WJW (Channel 8). The school district phone recordings and radio stations are the quickest to post the information. Television stations have between a 15-minute and 30-minute lag time before the information is posted an occasionally do post inaccurate messages. Also, a decision to close is announced by 8:00 a.m. at the very latest. Otherwise, we will remain open.

Message from Mr. Brightbill

The second grading period is among us as we bring the first quarter to a close. We have a lot to share as we continue to grow as a team in the four areas of effectiveness: High Expectations, Continuous Improvement, School Environment and Relationships.

Academically, we continue to set high expectations focusing on assessment design, aligning curriculum maps to new standards and implementing higher Depth of Knowledge (DOK) questions. We want to continue to extend the learning of all students, making sure students are challenged at all levels as they go through the learning process in academic areas. As a building, we are implementing DOK level 1-3 types of questions on a daily basis either instructionally or in assessment form (Formative and Summative). DOK level 4 types of questions are being achieved through projects, experiments and Problem Based Learning (PBL) Units. Please see the chart on Depth of Knowledge to understand what DOK may look like and what types of questions are at each level.

This academic school year, we have made several changes by adapting to a new bell schedule, adding more advanced courses to the master schedule, as well as, building in time for remediation to reteach concepts and standards. Our staff is involved with not only enhancing their knowledge with classroom content to share with students, but participating in several grants, book clubs and cohorts such as: Army Education Outreach Program (AEOP), Blended Learning/PBL grant, Gifted Cohort 2, Science LDC, Project Lead the Way and several others. Also, staff members and administrators are participating in two book clubs, reading "Advancing Differentiation" and "Bold School" to further our knowledge in both blended learning and differentiation.

MIDDLE SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

As noted above, NMS has implemented a new bell schedule this year to align better with the high school for middle school students taking high school courses and staff teaching those courses. We wanted to increase the effectiveness of extra help to cut down on the overall number of missing assignments, provide more time for remediation and independent projects and allow for more opportunities to take different courses throughout the day. We continue to gain feedback from the staff, parents and students to implement new ideas and address areas of improvement. This year, we will be sending out surveys to focus groups to gain information, feedback and data to take back to various committees to review.

Relationships across the building, district and the community are the key to academic success. As expectations continue to rise, we need to continue to work together as a team, both academically and socially. 6th Grade Science Class – Mrs. Raber

The students are building Electric / Solar Power cars to race for the overall title of the fastest car. The students are in teams of 3-5 students. The students have researched information about Transmission (Drive Train & Gear Ratio): Aerodynamics (Cars); Energy (Stored/Motion); Photovoltaic versus Batteries: and Mechanical Power (Friction and Speed). The students chose role positions: Task Master, Time Manager, Cost Analysis, Graphic Designer, and Public Relations. The students are using items from the Maker Space Cart and recycled materials to build their cars. The students are drafting the design of their car and making additional drafts as changes of made to the design. The students are analyzing the cost of the car with a budget of \$25 Raber Bucks. The students will be recording data and learning about Speed, Time, and Distance calculations. The overall winners will compete with the 5th, 7th, and 8th graders to determine who built the fastest car.

Middle School Mighlights

The Whit's End 5K that was organized and executed by the 6th graders was a huge success! Their project began with a Problem Based Learning Unit to solve the problem "How can we take action in a way that we inform, educate, and support our community impacted by cancer? With this as the 6th graders' mission, they designed a graphic organizer for a 5 Paragraph Informational Report in Language Arts.

The research began with healthy cells becoming abnormal (which correlates with the 6th Science curriculum) and then compared the cell differences. Next they chose a cancer of their own preference to research further. Paragraph 2 led in to its symptoms and treatment. They used various resources (Internet, interview with an expert or with someone directly impacted by cancer, books, YouTube video of someone with cancer) Paragraph 3 summarized the Whit's End website after note taking and a presentation in the auditorium by its co-founders, Sandy Kline and Cathy Ballinger. Paragraph 4 explained their personal extension activity they developed to be used during a 5K Event. The possible extension activities could have been: participation in the 5K, sign making, writing to and reaching out to businesses for donations, race post snack table, I had 3 girls that created a face painting pre-race and are asking for a donation that all supports Whit's End, one group made bracelets, another individual made 150 keychains using cancer color symbols for her designs, and some made display boards with their report/pics to have in the cafe the evening of the race. Paragraph 5 shared their thoughts, reflections, and future recommendations throughout the entire process.

It was exciting to feel the energy and to witness them taking ownership of the entire PBL process. They also loved the fact that Mrs. White, their 6th grade English Language Arts teacher and the facilitator throughout the duration, will have to run one mile for each of the 124 applicants. She has completed 90 miles as of 10/25/17. The students raised over \$1400 that will be given to The Whit's End Community Place.

Bullying Prevention Month

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CAREERS -- GET READY!!



Members have to determine slope, depth of topsoil, texture of surface soil, depth of soil, the natural drainage class of the soil, the land class, the best use for the land, and recommend conservation practices. The team placed 1st overall. David Miley earned 1st, Kyle Badger earned 3rd, Kyle Piscione earned 4th, and Briana Troyan earned 5th. On the urban side of the contest, Austen Wood, Cody Morrow, Cody Tegtmeier, Michael Nutter, and Beth Kanzeg competed. Urban soil judging teaches students to evaluate land and soil to determine its potential use for urban, home site, and other nonfarm uses. Members are required to determine the slope, land form, flood hazard, soil stability, surface texture, subsoil texture, depth to the bedrock or seasonal water table, and determine if there is a hard dense layer within four feet of the surface. The team was 1st overall. Wood was 1st, Tegtmeier was 3rd, Morrow was 6th, Nutter was 7th, and Kanzeg was 10th overall for the contest.

The state soils contest will be held on Saturday, October 14th. Both the urban and rural teams will be advancing to compete.



The Northwestern FFA Chapter is currently holding their annual citrus fruit, apples, and barbecue sauce sales. The fruit will come in the 1st or 2nd week of December, and the fruit baskets will be in at a time close to Christmas. 
